**ESSAY ON AGRICULTURE.**—The "Canadian Farm" of October 30 contains an essay by R. Louis Cairns, of Freetown, P.E.I., son of Mr. S. R. Cairns, on the teaching of agriculture in rural schools. This was submitted in competition with a great many others and won third prize. Master Cairns is to be congratulated on his success. Following is the essay in question:—The teaching of agriculture in our school is very deficient. A text-book is used treating on soils, rotations of crops, birds, insects and crop diseases, but as we have no school garden for practical work, the studying of agriculture is often tedious and uninteresting, and does not help with the work of the farm as it should. It has, however, taught me the value of birds to field crops in eating injurious insects, and when to use the different rotations of crops, but it has failed to arouse any interest in farming, and the desire to become a farmer. Nevertheless, the doing of practical work on the farm has created a strong desire to become a farmer. Agriculture could be introduced more fully into rural schools, without turning them into a preparatory branch of an agricultural college, by having a garden and orchard on the school grounds, and doing practical work, and in this way studying rotations of crops, insects, fruit growing, gardening, and the value of birds to field crops. A text-book should also be used giving rotations of feed for dairy and beef cattle, horses, sheep, pigs and poultry, and telling how to care for each. It should also contain a chapter treating on the management of the apiary, and the value of bees to clover and fruit trees. In short, the boys should be taught that when they get a farm of their own they will be fitted to farm in the best way, so they will not be mere agricultural machines working day after day, but men who are both efficient and enthusiastic in their profession.
