President Signs Loan Legislation

WASHINGTON, July 15—(AP)—With 26 souvenir pens, President Truman today signed the British loan legislation, enabling London to draw upon the \$3,750,000,000 credit immediately. Then, in an apparent reassurance for Moscow although he did not mention Russia in his statement, the president declared that "no one should think that this agreement between the United States and Great Britain is directed against any other country. It is not."

The system of trade we seek," his statement continued, "is open on the same terms to all the nations of the world." Mr. Truman also referred to the months of debate in Congress which preceded final action Saturday when the House of Representatives voted its approval. "Full and frank debate is a principle of the democratic system," he said, "and I believe that the time and care given to the consideration of the agreement are insurance that our approval rests on full understanding of the pattern of mutually beneficial economic relations among the nations of the world. It goes far to remove the danger of rival and antagonistic economic blocs."

INDIANS REWARDED FOR WAR GALLANTRY

NEW DELHI, India, July 15—(CP)—Many provinces in India have devised comprehensive schemes to reward those of their inhabitants who were decorated for gallantry during the Second Great War. These rewards range from \$3,300 for the Victoria Cross to \$1,000 for the Military Medal. In some cases land will be given in lieu of money.

TREE PLAN SUCCESS

The planting of trees to form shelter belts in the Great Plains States in the six years before the war, was for the most part successful. According to a recent survey, 80 per cent of the broad-leaf trees are alive, and 80 per cent of the evergreens.

Special Meeting Board Of Trade

A special meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade was held last evening in the civic building at which the president, W.M. Melish, presided. Mr. F.W. Hyndman, president of the Charlottetown Board, was present on invitation from the local Board. The meeting was held to discuss the case of the Board of Trade and the Board of Commissioners who will represent the Summerside Board of Trade at Charlottetown on Wednesday when the Maritime Board of Transport Commissioners will meet for a hearing on the present rates charged for carrying trucks on the railway between Borden and Cape Tormentine. Due to the confidential nature of the data being prepared and the possibility that premature publication might jeopardize the case of the Board, the members of the press were invited to remain as private citizens only. In view of the fact that the deliberations of the meeting were not for publication until the meetings held in Charlottetown on Wednesday, the members of the press withdrew out of consideration of the request of the president and the members who are preparing the necessary data.

Final Field Day At Iona

The final Field Day organized by the Division of Illustration Station, Charlottetown, in co-operation with the Provincial Department of Agriculture, Prince Edward Island and the Dominion Forestry Service, New Brunswick, was held on the Illustration Station farm of Wilbur J. Daly, Iona, Friday, July 12. Farmers eager to learn the latest terms in the marketing of potatoes of various standard varieties, the most recently recommended sprays for the control of early and late blight, and measures being adopted for the control of potato bugs attended from as far distant as Alliston. The program was opened with a demonstration on livestock by Mr. J. E. MacNeill, agricultural representative for Kings County. In the afternoon, the speaker discussed the importance of disease free potatoes in our potato industry. Mr. S. G. Peppin, district inspector, potato seed certification, P. E. Island, who emphasized the need of maintaining and establishing new markets. It was pointed out that almost care must be exercised in preserving our present potato stock and attacks of insects. Growers were advised to give the question of storage facilities increased acreage and cautioned as to the danger of transmitting disease to the use of old sacks. It was urged that hand sacks must be utilized. Farmers were urged to use a dipping solution consisting of twenty-five gallons of water.

Other Speakers

Dr. J. A. Clark, Superintendent, Experimental Station, dealt with an important topic, namely, "Prevention of Accidents on Farms and in the Home." The speaker reviewed cereal root rot experiments, a project active at this station. G. W. Ayers, assistant plant pathologist, Laboratory of Plant Pathology, Charlottetown, outlined the necessity of being taken to determine the deficiency of magnesium in potato soils of the Province, indicating the spread of disease and encouraging the production of a vigorous growing stand which would withstand attacks of insects and tree diseases. Carefully prepared exhibits in connection with woodlot management held the attention of all present. The speaker in his very practical manner covering each in detail and resolving to many well directed questions.

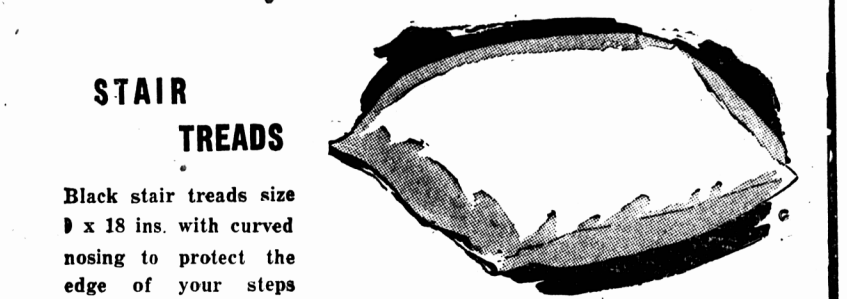
