**Special Migration Officers Visits The Maritimes**

(Special to the Guardian)  
MONCTON, N. B., Sept. 15.—On a visit to Danish settlements in the Maritime Provinces, Mr. P. Poulsen, migration secretary Y. M. C. A., Copenhagen, Denmark, left Moncton yesterday on the ocean limited of the Canadian National Railways to visit settlements in Nova Scotia.

For the past week he has been visiting Danish colonies in New Brunswick in company with a representative of the Colonization Department of the national system, and was particularly pleased with the success with which his countrymen have adapted themselves to the country and are apparently succeeding in their colonizing efforts.

We visited the Danish settlement at New Denmark, the oldest in the Maritime Provinces, dating from 1872 and also at Apohaqui, N. B. He thinks there is a great opportunity for the development of cooperative dairies in the various centres in the Maritimes along the lines of those in Denmark which have proved such a success. These are community affairs and he is of the opinion that they could be successfully established with the cooperation of native farmers.

Mr. Poulsen attended the world conference of the Y. M. C. A. in Toronto, Ontario, and later in Cleveland, Ohio. He has travelled quite extensively in the United States and also in Canada, having travelled from coast to coast as he has just recently done.

Speaking with regard to affairs in Denmark, for which country he sails in a couple of weeks, he said that like the rest of the world they are suffering from the depression and it is difficult to forecast just what the outcome will be. He feels, however, that matters will eventually right themselves but the various countries in the world at the present time are having a hard time of it. Denmark, he said, is meeting severe competition in the British market from New Zealand and Russia with regard to butter and from other countries with regard to other products. Great Britain, he said, is their big market and the Danes are anxiously awaiting the outcome of events in the next few months. There are, he stated, many Danish families who would be glad to emigrate to Canada but the immigration laws, of course, permit only of a small number entering from time to time.

**BRITISH POLICE ACTED SWIFTLY**

LONDON, Eng., Sept. 15.—Tracking down a drug trafficker in a boarding house in a suburb of the city, London detectives discovered documents which contained the secrets of a world-wide gang of "dope" traders, and which ultimately led to the suppression of the gang's activities in Germany, France, and Japan. This dramatic coup is revealed in the Home Office report on dangerous drugs to the League of Nations for 1910.

First word of the trafficker, according to the report came from Holland, where the officials warned the one office that a Japanese, Katsutoshi Tsunemitsu, had been found to be responsible for a shipment of two hundredweights of heroin smuggled from Constantinople to Hamburg, and seized at Rotterdam. He had fled from Holland to London.

British police acted swiftly. They traced Tsunemitsu on every stage of his flight through England. They followed him to London, and found him in a boarding house in a northern suburb. Next, a warrant was issued under the Dangerous Drugs Act, and the Japanese was surprised in his rooms. His papers were searched, and also two trunks which were stored with another Japanese in the west end. Then came the surprise.

**TELEPHONIC COMMUNICATION GREATLY EXTENDED**

CAPE TOWN, South Africa, Sept. 15. (By The Canadian Press)—Telephony added a further stride of 350 miles to its long-distance range recently, when Pietersmaritzburg—1,009 miles away—was brought within speaking range of Cape Town, the line making the first commercial telephonic communication between the two provinces, Cape Colony and Natal. Durban is at present beyond the speech range of the repeater system from Cape Town, although it is possible to speak to Durban and Cape Town, but it was only through very special apparatus set up on the occasion of the Prince of Wales's visit about six years ago. Post Office officials have also communicated with Durban from Cape Town, but the line is at present so faint that it is useless commercially, and, therefore, is not open for public use.

**Documents Examined**

A close examination of the documents found showed that Tsunemitsu was the agent of a wealthy gang of Japanese drug traffickers, for whom he smuggled "dope" in vast quantities from Constantinople to Hamburg.

The secret documents gave the names and addresses of many illicit dealers, chiefly in Turkey, France, and Japan. They were rushed to the authorities of the different countries, and the investigations led to the end of activities of the notorious dealers. The case was also important from another aspect. It established the fact that the derivative of morphine benzylmorphine—supplied under the trade name peronin—which had hitherto been considered to be innocuous was being used by traffickers for conversion into knowledge of Italian art and to draw the appreciative attention of the outside world.

The students are aided in the usual sojourn and passport formalities. The Minister of Communications authorized a 30 per cent reduction for foreign students registering for the cultural courses in Rome, Varese, Siena, Florence and Venice.

**Scientific Topics**

At Varese many foreign and Italian doctors attended a course of studies dedicated to interesting scientific topics. The course was offered by the Institute of Medical Culture.

Florence and Siena, where the purest and most harmonious Italian is spoken, offered summer courses chiefly dedicated to a thorough study of the Italian language. At the same time the students were given an opportunity to visit the immense art treasures contained in the palaces and churches of the two cities.

The courses at Perugia, seat of the Royal University for Foreigners, were of particular interest. This Umbrian city is eminently adapted for study and also offers countless opportunities for excursions to the many towns dotting the verdant Umbrian plain.

**Novelties In Stage Lighting in London**

LONDON, Sept. 16. (By The Canadian Press)—Novelities in stage lighting have been introduced at the Alhambra Theatre by Hassard Short, well known producer, who at present is putting on "Waltzes from Vienna" as the Alhambra attraction, and a recent demonstration was given to newspaper men. A writer in The Observer thus describes the new lighting.

"Hitherto," said Mr. Short, "the custom has been to utilize the stage itself for the concentration of lights but I depend more on the auditorium. In addition to having the footlights transferred to the front of the circle, I have about 36 spot lights concealed at different part of the auditorium. These hidden spots can be operated singly or jointly so that the precise degree of light necessary to soften or accentuate the action on the stage can be assured. The audience cannot see these spot lights, as they are counteracted by bridge lights and telescopic lamps. The latter are fitted with surprise pink shutters, which make everything white appear whiter still. Their scope can be extended or contracted, thus making it possible to illuminate the whole of the stage or merely the pupil of an artist's eye. I have also had fitted in about three dozen dimmers, which is more than the number used by any other 12 theatres combined. The total load of electricity now being carried at the Alhambra is 1,500 amps."

**WAR MEMORIAL WILL BE COMPLETED BY CHRISTMAS**

LONDON, Sept 14—Sixty work by six brothers will culminate at Christmas in the completion of the great Canadian National War Memorial to stand in Connaught square, Ottawa—one of the big tasks ever undertaken by sculptors in England.

It is five years since the Canadian Government selected the sign of Mr. Vernon March as more than a hundred submitted sculptors all over the world. When the young English sculptor died last year, leaving his work unfinished, his six brothers, all whom had shared in creating the design, carried on the work. The brother is an expert in his particular phase of the art and the work is being directed by the eldest brother, Mr. Sydney March.

The Memorial will consist of a colossal figure of Peace and Victory—12 feet high—gazing from a 60 foot triumphal arch, upon representative figures of the Canadian Forces on the march. The figures of soldiers, sailors, airmen and nurses in heroic proportions, will appear in the group. Seventeen of the number are now completed and the Memorial will be ready for shipment to Canada in the spring.

The completed Memorial undoubtedly will prove one of the most imposing tributes to the Fallen Heroes of the Great War as anticipated, it is illuminated at night, will present a wonderful sight.
