Recently Dr. Heartz, a native of this City, visited Port Maitland, N. B., travelling twenty-seven miles and preaching twice to large congregations.

The Daughters of the Empire intend holding an evening of Bridge Whist at the Armories on Tuesday, 25th February, under the distinguished patronage of His Honor the Lieut. Governor and the D. O. C.

In the Dominion House of Commons a few days ago A. A. McLean member for Queens, asked: 1. Has any contract been entered into for the construction of a new block on the east side of the railway wharf, and connected with it, at Souris, Prince Edward Island? 2. If so, who has the contract? 3. Was the contract let by public tender? 4. What is the amount of the contract? 5. How much has been paid to the contractor to date? 6. Is this block being constructed for government purposes? If so, what? To this Rt. Hon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier (Prime Minister), replied: 1. Yes; for an extension to the present wharf at Souris. Contract awarded to E. A. Walling, his tender being the lowest. 2. Yes. 3. Schedule rates. 4. \$47,460.44. Yes, for the requirements of the Prince Edward Island Railway.

Mr. Lafurge asked last week in the Dominion House of Commons: Has the government received the following numerous signed petition? If so, what is the intention of the government as to the matter therein set forth:—

To the Honorable L. P. Brodeur, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, Ottawa.

'Hon. Sir,—The petition of the undersigned, fishermen and other citizens of Prince Edward Island, humbly sheweth

1. That under the present system of control in the lobster fisheries off the coast, licenses are restricted to certain parties with a right to catch and put up lobsters within a certain coastal area and within a given season.

2. That licenses for new factories have been exceedingly difficult to obtain.

3. That a number of the larger packing establishments, especially those in the hands of foreigners, have gradually acquired the plant and licenses of less important local packers.

4. That such control of the industry by monopoly is detrimental to the best interests of the province.

5. That by such restriction of licenses the poorer fishermen are shut out from the larger emoluments of the industry.

6. That rich corporations, especially those with headquarters in foreign countries, have recently acquired many franchises in the province of Prince Edward Island.

7. That these corporations are a menace to the rights of fishermen, and many control the prices paid, raising them for the moment, thus driving out the smaller firms unable to compete with them, and then lowering the prices to the great damage of such fishermen.

8. That this system of license inaugurated for the preservation of the fisheries should be modified on occasion requires, and certainly in such circumstances as we have cited.

"Therefore, we ask for the restoration of the rights of the fishermen of the province to secure licenses whenever such conditions as these arise, and thus prevent great injury being done to the fisheries and fishermen.

"And your petitioners will ever pray."

Hon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier replied (for the Minister of Marine): Yes. It has been the subject of representations which are receiving the most serious consideration.

What Ben? There were nineteen passengers to Georgetown by the Minto Saturday.

The mail train arrived in this City at 1.15 Saturday with forty bags of mail.

The following committee of Methodist ministers well known in this Province have been appointed to confer with the Social Reform Council for the Province of Nova Scotia at their next annual conference: Revs. J. W. Aitken, W. A. Outerbridge and W. R. Turner.

A merchant of this Province, says The Maritime Merchants, tells that paper that business has been very good the past fall, and he has done the very much larger shipping business than usual, his staff all going over the new Murray Harbor Branch of the P. E. Island Railway. He has the same complaint that is frequently made by merchants, namely, that the farmers do not get their produce in on an advancing market, and by holding very often lose the high prices; and when they do haul their produce in, and the merchants has to take the stuff in settlement of his account, he has to hold it a long time before he can realize on it.

Mary Ann McNeill, relict of the late Alexander McNeill, died at the home of her son, Village Green, on Thursday morning Feb. 6th, 1908. Mrs. McNeill was born in Eng. the year 1823. She came to Prince Edward Island, when she was but 7 years of age. She leaves to mourn two sisters, Mrs. David C. Irving, Cherry Valley, and Mrs. John Pickard, Dakota. Also one son Daniel, with whom she had been living, the only surviving child of a family of nine; and sixteen grand children and a large number of friends and neighbors to mourn their loss. Her remains were laid to rest in the cemetery at Pownal. The service was conducted by Rev. D. R. Chowen.

Asked recently in the House of Commons has the government taken any steps to arrange the dispute existing between the Dominion and the maritime provinces concerning the fisheries and if so, what are they? Sir Wilfrid Laurier said: The government is appointing a delegate with power to discuss with accredited representatives of the various local governments affected, the question of the relative rights and jurisdiction with respect to the fisheries; that the government is unaware of any difficulties which should prevent an amicable settlement of rights, and appreciates that the fisheries interests could proceed on a better and more satisfactory basis with undivided jurisdiction.

A delegation from Nova Scotia will shortly proceed to Ottawa to urge upon the Government the necessity of placing the Canadian Atlantic Fisheries under the control of a Board (fashioned upon the lines of the Fisheries Board of Scotland). It is expected that New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island will also send delegations, and if possible that they will go at the same time as the one from Nova Scotia. The argument in favor of the change is almost unanswerable, says the Maritime Merchant, though it expects there will be more or less opposition from some within the Maritime departments. "It will be only natural therefore, if the Minister at first demurs about making the change, but it will have to come very soon, and he might as well make up his mind to do it, right away with respect to the fisheries. Practically every man in the business is agreed on this point."
