Older Boys Conference At Hunter River

The Older Boys' Conference in Hunter River which had been planned for the middle of January and postponed on account of small-pox, was held on March 11-13. The 47 boys and leaders in attendance from different communities between Summerside and Charlottetown. The Conference opened on Friday evening in the United Church at 8 o'clock with an opening Service of Worship conducted by Rev. E. M. Attkin, Cornwall. This was followed by a lecture of officers under the direction of the visiting Conference leader, Mr. H. H. Simpson, which resulted as follows: Grand Preter, has, Stuart, Central Bedouet, Grand Deputy Preter, Bruce Callack, Summerside, Grand Scriptor, Elwell LePage, Hunter River; Mr. Impton then led a general discussion in which practically all of the delegates participated. Following this the session closed with prayer by Rev. R. H. Baxter of Hunter River.

On Saturday morning the first session was held at 9 o'clock and opened with a service of Worship led by Rev. Mr. Baxter. The conference leader then divided the conference into three squares which would meet throughout the Conference for discussion periods under the leadership of Mr. Herman Myers, Carleton; Rev. E. M. Attkin, Cornwall and Mr. Harold Mabey, Borden. In the square sessions the boys discussed the Three C's ideal of clean speech, clean habits, clean sportsmanship and committees were appointed to draft resolutions which would be submitted later for definite approval. At the close of this discussion the squares reassembled and the Conference was addressed by Rev. Mr. Attkin on "A Boy and His Fellow-men." Following this the squares again retired for discussion on the Morning Watch—the habit of daily Bible reading and prayer. The morning session of the Conference adjourned with prayer led by Mr. Myers.

The afternoon session was opened with a Service of Worship led by the Grand Preter, Chas. Stuart, and this was followed by an address on "The Boy and His Education" by Rev. Mr. Baxter. This address was followed by considerable discussion which was participated in by several of the boys and leaders. Mr. Simpson then led a discussion on the principles and methods of Tuxie work at the close of which the Conference divided for their third square session at which the different groups discussed the question of the outstanding needs of their communities, and ways and means of meeting these needs. The session adjourned at 5 o'clock with prayer by the Grand Preter.

At 6 o'clock the Conference Banquet was held in the Masonic Hall, the supper being arranged and prepared by a committee of ladies, and served by the young ladies of the village. The Grand Preter presided and the following toast list was carried out, the speeches being of a very high order throughout.

Closing Prayer—Mr. H. H. Simpson. On Sunday morning the boys attended Sunday School in a body, while Rev. Mr. Baxter went out to a morning appointment at Hampshire and Mr. Simpson conducted.

Following the doxology, the invocation by the Grand Preter and a Hymn, the Scripture Lesson was read by Elwell LePage, Grand Scriptor. A solo by George Clark, Cavendish, one of the boys of the Conference, followed. Nell Bradshaw, Harold Mabey, Clifford Proud, Wilbur Younker, Chas. Stuart and Rev. Mr. Baxter led in prayer at this point. The offering consisted of a solo by Herb Thompson, one of the youngest boys of the Conference. After another hymn the Grand Preter called on Mr. Simpson to address the congregation.

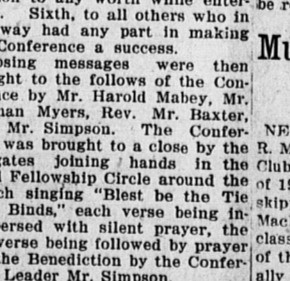

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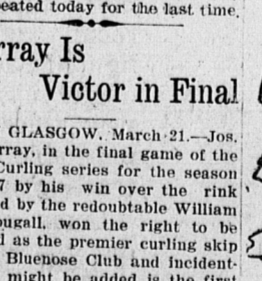

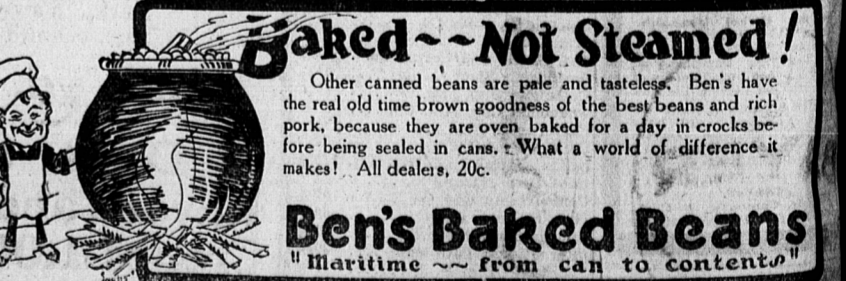
