**Montreal Exchange**

MONTREAL, Aug. 13-(CP)—A mild upswing among a number of stocks was the chief characteristic of trading on the stock exchange today. Buyers poked leaders in mines, industrials and utilities for light support.

International Nickel and Hudson Bay Mining went higher in the metals section though Consolidated Smelters lagged. Among industrials, the Canadian Car preferred bettered their positions. Dominion Coal preferred and Asbestos were fractionally behind.

Headed by Montreal Power, electric utilities were in higher ground. Other gainers were Shawinigan and Brazilian. Power Corporation did not recover an opening deficit.

Among other issues boarded, Dominion Textile lost a couple of points, and Industrial Paper and Power a point.

Total sales, 23,100 shares; Industrials, 4,300; Mines, 18,800; Bonds \$7,300.

**CURRENCIES**

NEW YORK, Aug. 13-(CP)—The Canadian dollar declined 1-16 of a cent in foreign exchange dealings today, closing at a discount of 11 7/16 per cent (88.56 1/4) in terms of United States funds.

The British pound was unchanged at \$4.03 3/4.

The Argentine free peso advanced 1/2 of a cent to 23.92 cents, a new 1941 high. The Hong Kong dollar was off a shade at 25.35 cents while other leading foreign currencies were unchanged.

**Toronto Exchange**

TORONTO, Aug. 13-(CP)—Stocks moved within a narrow price range today on the Toronto exchange. Total turnover was 245,000 shares.

Arntfield, O'Brien and Bear Exploration, accounted for 130,000 shares, more than half the day's total. O'Brien traded 24,000 shares and touched 1.59 before backing up to 1.55 for a net gain of 4. Arntfield traded 75,000 shares on a gain of 1-2 to 9 1/2. Bear closed 1-2 down at 10 1/4.

Minor losses were netted by Ches-terville, MacLeod-Cockshutt, Paymaster, Sylvanite and Wright-Hargreaves against small gains for Kerr-Addison, Macassa, Perron, Pioneer, Premier and Teck Hughes. Dome weakened 1-8 and other senior goods held steady.

Nickel and Smelters posted gains of 1-4 and other senior base metal shares were unchanged. Steep Rock was active and up 4 at 174.

Minor gains came out for the Hudson Bay Mining and Smelters and Distillers-Seagrams and Canada Malt-tinger firmed 1-2.

Declines in points appeared for Goodyear Tire common, N. O. S. All classes of livestock were steady. The few cattle offered brought \$5 to \$7 for common quality steers. **Grain**

CHICAGO, Aug. 13-(AP)—An advance of about two cents a bushel in wheat prices today wiped out the loss that had been made when occurred since last Thursday when the four year peaks were established. Prices closed only a little more than a cent below those tops.

Buying of mills and processors short sellers was noted in the wheat pit while corn rose about a cent.

Wheat closed 1 7/8—2 1/4 cents higher than yesterday. September \$11 3/4—5 8, December \$11 3/8—1 4, corn 7 3/8—1 higher, September \$7 3/8—1 2, December \$1 5/8; oats 1—1 1/4 higher.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 13-(CP)—Although trade thinned in the late stages of today's session on Winnipeg grain exchange, wheat futures prices closed 1-1/8—1-8 cents higher, with a volume of wheat estimated at about 750,000 bushels, changing hands.

Final quotations were 75 1/2 for October, 77 for December and 81 1/4 cents a bushel for May futures.

Oats and barley made good headway in the coarse grain pit, registering gains of more than a cent. Limited local buying in rye, and scattered flax purchases were sufficient to cause an advance of more than 1 1/2 cents in those commodities.

Buenos Aires prices were unchanged at noon.

Every gasoline purchaser will be requested to sign one. He will then be given a Union Jack windshield sticker like the one this fair pledge-signer displays.

**Today's War Map**



The news from Russian front is less favorable than at any time during the last month. The Russian forces south of Kiev have suffered rather severe reverses, and the Germans are moving in a southerly direction down both sides of the Bug river toward Nikolaiiv and Kherson, threatening to outflank the Russians on the lower Dniester and the garrison at Odessa. The Germans claim that they have reached the region of Um-n, which means a 10-mile advance, to have taken 30,000 Russian prisoners and to have seized the commander-in-chief of the Sixth Soviet army and many of his staff. The capture of the Russian staff suggests a genuine break-through. On the map the battlefront in the Ukraine is as it was last week is shown. The Germans now are far to the northeast of Balti, at least a hundred miles, moving in a general direction toward Sebastopol. A hasty retreat of the Russian left wing may be forced unless strong counter-offensive action is taken at once.
