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King's Son A Waiter

BUDAPEST, May 12 (British United Press)—A bald elderly man, who for five years has been serving refreshments at the station buffet at Varallo, has just been revealed as the son of a dethroned king. His secret might never have been brought to light had it not been for the inquisitiveness of a new stationmaster who investigated his papers and found that the restaurant keeper's father was Leo XIII, King of the Armenian Korassan.

For nearly a thousand years twenty-five of Guido di Lusignano's ancestors (for that is his present name) were rulers in the east. One of them was King of Jerusalem in 1186, and seventeen members of his family were at one time rulers of Cyprus. His father was dethroned by the Tsar and ceased with the failure of the King's banker. Living for a while on the sale of his jewels he took up the career of an artist, and painted one picture which won a prize at a Milan exhibition. "A woman with a Rose," the portrait of a poor Italian girl whom he married. King Leo died fifty-five years ago in great poverty, leaving five children, one of them Guido di Lusignano, who became a waiter.

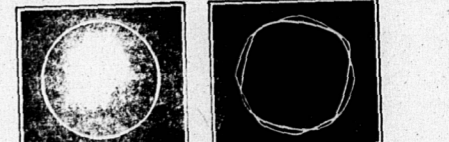

ULTRA-VIOLET RAYS REVEAL FORGERIES

LONDON, May 11—Ultra-violet rays are now being used by the Bank of England and other leading banks in the detection of forgeries and counterfeit checks. The special device employed for this purpose is called "black light" and is so simple in operation that it is expected that it will eventually be adopted by every police force in the country. It is not improbable that before long it will form part of the equipment of stores and offices.

The new apparatus has just been demonstrated in London. It consists of a powerful electric light and a filter which eliminates the white light so that it is possible for the remaining ultra violet rays to detect evidences of adulteration and forgery which cannot be detected by the naked eye. The "black light" was thrown upon forged stock certificates and counterfeit notes and faked stamps and revealed differences in textures and tints. Other demonstrations with counterfeit jewels showed up the false gems quite clearly. Various possibilities for the "black light" in crime detection were discussed, among them the plan of marking articles with invisible ink for the purpose of identifying forged checks and stolen articles.

OLD NEWSPAPERS EXPORTED
CHICAGO, May 12. (U. P.)—A million dollars worth of old newspapers is exported from the United States annually for use mostly as wrapping paper in the bazaars of Far Eastern cities and wall paper in China, according to a report of the national industrial conference board on foreign trade statistics.
