F., who was accidentally killed while training at Camp Borden, Ontario. Mr. MacLeod belonged to Prince Edward Island and left home only a few months ago to join the 4th Bn. Corps. It makes it all the more sad as he was one of our brave soldier boys who went through a great deal of the hardships of war and was badly gassed. He was awarded with the 1915, P. E. I. Land Highlanders "Bennie" as he was familiarly known was well respected and liked by everybody and has a host of relatives and friends who will deeply mourn their loss. The heartfelt sympathy goes out to them in their sorrow.

His untimely death at the early age of 21 years is deeply regretted by all. His remains were forwarded to Prince Edward Island for interment and were laid to rest in Belfast Cemetery.
