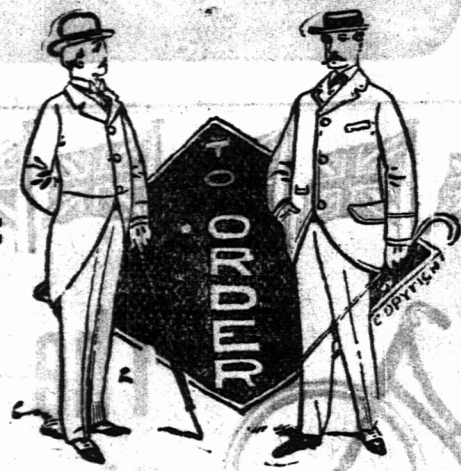

Gertrude Coghlan, the talented daughter of the late Charles Coghlan, will star as Becky Sharp next season.—Montreal Star.

A MEETING of Court Avondale will be held Tuesday next to make arrangements for the annual church parade which takes place on June 17th. It is probable that both Courts will participate in the event.

Mr. Hector McLeod and Mrs. McLeod returned home yesterday from a two months' visit to Mr. McLeod's brother Mr. W. G. McLeod of Cambridge. Mr. McLeod reports the season in advance of P. E. Island and the lawns have been mown for the second time. While away he met a large number of Islanders all of whom occupy prominent positions. While in Cambridge Mr. McLeod was able to learn the proceedings of the P. E. Island Legislature from the American journals.

Chicken fattening has proved a success. W. M. Black, of the Wolfville chicken fattening station, has made a great success of his poultry business, says an exchange. He has made a profit of \$1.50 each on the hens he has kept for stock. His incubators turned out 89 1/2 per cent, and 92 per cent of chicks respectively. He raises White Wyandottes, as he considers them the best for all purposes.

THE Morning Chronicle of June 2nd says:—James G. Jamieson and wife, left for Charlottetown yesterday, where Mr. Jamieson takes over the drug business, formally owned by Dr. Dodd. Mr. Jamieson has been in the employ of Brown & Webb, of this city, for a number of years and was a greatly surprised Thursday afternoon on being called into their office, and presented with a check for a very substantial amount, accompanied by a letter wishing him success in his business venture. Immediately after, amidst the assembled employees, Mr. Bell handed Mr. Jamieson an address, accompanied by a piece of silver, suitably engraved, as a token of esteem from the employees. Mr. Jamieson has a large number of friends in Halifax who will wish him success, which with his characteristic energy and genial disposition he is quite likely to attain.

THE Evangelical Churchman of May 31st: The annual report of St. Paul's Church, Charlottetown, shows that this old parish is going on vigorously under the rectorship of the Rev. T. Leo Williams. The church finances seem to be in a very satisfactory state according to the account of Mr. H. J. Cundall, people's-warden. But a not less satisfactory sign is the evidence of active life in the societies connected with the church. Mr. Williams has so lately taken charge that he has not disturbed the existing societies, except to revive the Boy's Brigade, which is now going on splendidly, and to inaugurate the Young Men's Society. The other societies, however, seem to be infused with vigorous life, and show that this parish is certainly wide-reaching in its range of operations. These include the Mite Society, King's Daughters, Mothers' Meeting, Dorcas Society, Gleaners' Union, Women's Auxiliary, senior and junior; Band of Hope, Young Men's Society, and the Boys' Brigade. Two Sunday-schools are carried on with very gratifying results, and the church shows great interest in both home and foreign missions.

Brief reference was made in yesterday morning's GUARDIAN to the year book of the Ottawa Canoe Club, on the editorial staff of which is Mr. W. W. Moore formerly one of Charlottetown's most popular young men and who is at present connected with the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa. In his report as secretary of the Club Mr. Moore says:—"The year just closed has been one of progress, and in every respect it has been the banner year in the history of the club. . . . You will be pleased to learn that the membership has substantially increased during the year, and that it is now larger than at any time in our history." In referring to the history of the club the introductory reference says:—"Great oaks from little acorns grow." Some eighteen years ago seven gentlemen of Ottawa formed themselves into an association for the exercise and promotion of the noble art of paddling. Five of the seven are happily still with us and they certainly can be pardoned a feeling of honest pride in the outcome of their early labors. They banded better than they knew. For the Ottawa Canoe Club, with a present membership of 270, and still in its growing time, is the lineal descendant and representative of that company of seven; and we honor them as our founders."
