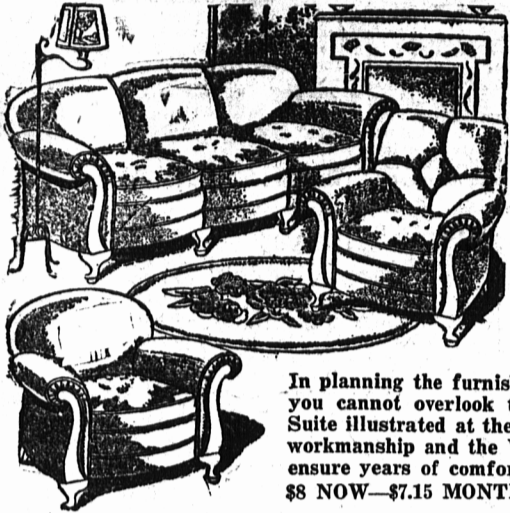

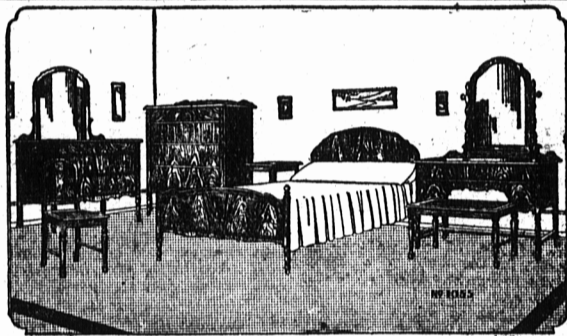

Memorial Service Held For Miss Aitken

WALTHAM, Mass., Oct. 14—A memorial service for Miss Ada J. Aitken, for many years closely associated with the business and church life of this city, was held last evening at the First Presbyterian Church of which she was a devoted member. Rev. Alan L. Blacklock, the pastor, spoke in eulogy of Miss Aitken, stressing as outstanding qualities in her life, her ability to convey joy and happiness to others; her desire in her business to please her customers, placing herself in abeyance; and her example set in her church membership. Mr. Blacklock spoke of Miss Aitken's long service as a church member and a business woman, thirty-five years of her life having been spent in Waltham, where her uniformly courteous manner and helpful disposition had endeared her to all with whom she was associated. She frequently went out of her way to do for others. Her church service was emphasized by regularity in attendance; a co-operative spirit; a willingness to serve and a constant sharing of her blessings with others. Her aim in all her dealings was exemplified in the quotation, "a soft answer turneth away wrath," on which Mr. Blacklock based part of his theme. Her life, the pastor said, presented a challenge to all in its relationship with church, society and business. Miss Aitken died Thursday, September 27th, in Toronto, Canada, after a long and trying illness, borne with fortitude and cheerfulness. Her funeral took place in Lower Montague, Prince Edward Island, which was her birthplace. Among those who attended the service here last evening were many of her associates from the Clifford S. Cobb Store where she was employed for thirty-five years, including its manager, John E. Cobb, and Mrs. Cobb. The service opened with organ music played by Miss Muriel Neilly, and a rendering by the choir of "The Lord is My Shepherd," and "Sweet Peace," two favorite hymns of Miss Aitken. Other favorite hymns were played during the service. Miss Aitken had been superintendent of the primary department of the Church School, and a member of the Missionary Society and Women's Guild. Eugene Goossens, the composer and operatic conductor, who is now in Paris, has been made a Chevalier of the Legion of Honor for services in connection with French music.

(Special to The Guardian) MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 15.—Another opportunity to travel at low first-class fares will be provided by the two railways over the Remembrance Day weekend when a special rate of single fare and one quarter for the round trip will be in effect between all stations in Canada and
