**Notice Re Intoxicated Drivers**

The Highway Traffic Act of 1936 provides that any person convicted of driving, or being in charge of, a motor vehicle while intoxicated shall have his operator's license cancelled for a period of at least a year. The Act further provides that his license shall not be reinstated within the period of cancellation.

The Legislature has therefore taken away all discretion to reinstate licenses which have been cancelled for intoxicated driving, and no applications for such reinstatement can be considered under any circumstances.

**Stock Prices Dip Following Early Rally**

NEW YORK, May 10—Stocks generally tipped backward in today's market after a morning rally. The attempt failed to carry through.

While business news continued cloudy, and Washington developments lacked stimulating qualities, marketwise brokers attributed the moderate setback mainly to the desire of traders to cash profits on the recent substantial comeback.

The Associated Press average of 60 issues was off 5 1/2 points at 412.2. Traders totaled 1,044,140 shares compared with 1,018,150 Monday.

Canadian issues were generally lower. Lake Shore was down 1/2 point with a loss of 1-1/8 points to 50. Dome International Nickel, McIntyre, Imperial Oil and Industrial Alcohol were easy. Fractional improvements were listed by Harsco, Walkers and Distillers-Seagram.

Tire Company stocks led the forenoon upswing, but most lost vigor at the finish. Seals, motors and oils gave ground easily. Aircraft enjoyed a temporary advance but subsequently tripped up. Utilities took a rest and rails were moderately lower. Losses running to a point or so predominated at the finish, with isolated shares down 2 to 3.

NEW YORK, May 10 (AP)—Major European currencies were held to a narrow course today as stabilization funds operated to offset fluctuations caused by the continued heavy repatriation of French capital.

The French franc closed unchanged at 2.80 while sterling advanced 1/4 cent at \$4.97 3/8. The Canadian dollar closed at a discount of 21-32 1-32.

MONTREAL, May 10 (CP)—The Pound Sterling declined 7-16 of a cent to \$5.00 11-32 on Montreal foreign exchanges today while the French franc held about even at 2.81 15-32. The United States dollar remained unchanged at 5-8 cent premium.

WINNIPEG, May 10 (CP)—Winnipeg wheat futures, moving erratically within a 1-1/2 cent range, closed near the day's low points. 1-4-1-2 under yesterday's final quotations. There was little interest in dealings as all North American wheat markets awaited official Washington and Ottawa government crop reports.

Indifference overseas and slow demand for wheat carried values down from the start. The May future closed at 1.15 1-8, July 1.06 7-8 and Oct 87 1-4 3-8 cents. Spreads for top grade Red Springs slipped a cent or more in listless dealings. Coarse grain futures, also were quiet, with port interest supporting barley oats a little higher.

Final futures values were oats 5-8 higher to 1-8 lower barley 3-8 higher, flax 1-2 higher to unchanged and rye 5-8 lower.
