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Labor Party Frames

Motion of Censure

(Canadian Press) LONDON, June 28. - The labor party today framed a motion of censure which they will move in the House of Commons next week declaring that the Baldwin House of Lords reform scheme "jerry-manders the constitution in the interests of the House of Commons of control of finance, entrenches the lords on a hereditary basis and in defiance of every precedent of modern times 'robs the electors of the power to deal with the upper house.'"

Summer School

For Toronto

TORONTO, Ont., June 28. - On July 4th some 400 women and the majority of them teachers, will commence Summer School courses at the University of Toronto. Most of these working students will be studying for the degrees of Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Pedagogy, or Doctor of Pedagogy. The remainder are enrolled for special courses.

Summer school courses are an important branch of the college extension work, directed by the university. They accommodate those living too far from Toronto or Hamilton to attend the evening lecture courses conducted at those places during the regular college term. The first summer course was held in 1916, while the extension lectures were inaugurated in 1918.

"Approximately three thousand persons benefited by the extension course this year," stated William James Dunlop, director of this department. "During its nine years of activity the extension work has developed into a university in itself."

Teacher candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Arts have taken their first year of arts work, and fifteen subjects remain for them to cover. These subjects are covered in five years, either through the evening lecture course or the summer school.

Summer school lecturers in the arts subjects this year are: Zoology, Dr. W. H. Ballie; second year history, Dr. G. W. Brown; third year history, Prof. F. Flenny; fourth year history, L. Pearson; history of philosophy, Prof. F. H. Adams; first and third year French, Prof. W. J. McAndrews; mathematics, I. R. Pounder; and economics, V. W. Bladen.

Among the subjects included in the graduate courses in education are educational psychology, the history of education and the science of education.

The course in the art of the Theatre which was added to the Summer School programme last year again promises to be one of the most interesting features. It will be conducted by Prof. Theodore Viehman, of Pittsburgh, with T. Tremaine Larstang in charge of stagecraft and Melville C. Keay of costuming. The classes will be held at the splendidly equipped Hart House Theatre.

The Markets

MONTREAL, June 28. - The export trade in grain on the Montreal market was quiet today. This was due to the fact that English exporters were not disposed to respond to the higher prices asked. Only a few loads of wheat were revealed no change.

Prices were maintained at the late advance. Supplies were of a limited nature and this was small. Car lots of American sample corn were quoted at \$1.05 1/2, Argentine corn at \$1.05 1/2 per bushel. Spring wheat grades of flour were strong and millers generally marked up prices ten cents per barrel for the soft grades. First patents sold at 89, seconds at 88, and strong bakers at \$3.30 per barrel in jute bags, extra-tract, less ten cents per barrel for spot cash. Business, however, was quiet with the demand small. The advance is a reaction of the strength displayed in cash wheat at Winnipeg for the past few days.

The undertone was firm and winter wheat grades were firm and prices went unchanged with a small amount of business transacted. The continued steady demand for all grades of millfeed and the present limited production of commodity held firm. A fair amount of business was done. A moderate trade was done in rolled oats and prices were without any feature. Prices for all grades were maintained, with a fair amount of business transacted. Supplies were ample to meet all demands. Receipts were 3701 cases. Trading in the crop of Canadian potatoes was quiet but the demand for new American potatoes was steady. Business was fairly brisk in the latter commodity yesterday's prices. The undertone to the better market was steady. The volume of business was small. Receipts were 1075 packages. The cheese market was again quiet. There was no change for deep
