Stage Driver Recalls Early Days on Coast

VANCOUVER, Feb. 27.—(C.P.)—Hugh Murray, 80, one of the few surviving old-time stage-coach drivers, recalls the time before the railways came when he drove over the old Cariboo Trail.

At the age of three years he sailed with his parents from England in October, 1856, and seven months later their little vessel docked in Esquimalt Harbor, Vancouver Island.

Mr. Murray, senior, and engineer, had been sent from England to assist in developing the new country, and the family went to Langley, B. C. There he joined the "boundary party," entrusted with the task of defining the Canadian-United States boundary, and young Hugh accompanied him.

After a brief period in school, the lad set out on his own and for many years roamed through all parts of British Columbia in company with miners and surveyors. He vividly recalls taking a number of cattle over the Rockies from Vancouver to Calgary, requiring three months for the trip.

"We made money in those days," says the sturdy old pioneer, "but living was high. I recall paying 75 cents each for eggs at Barkerville, B. C., and \$1.50 for a pie. It'd cost

REGINA'S TRADE BOARD SURPRISED

REGINA, Feb. 27.—(C.P.)—Regina's Board of Trade is wondering whether the prairie city's former name of "Pile o' Bones," which they believed almost forgotten, has prompted the query from a London, Eng. firm asking for sources of supply of bones for shipment to England.

The cognomen was derived from an enormous pile of bones left in the vicinity many years ago by buffalo hunters. Wascana Lake was then known as "Pile o' Bones Creek."

His Majesty's Assistant Trade Commissioner at Winnipeg requested the British firm's request to the Regina board. The bones are needed for manufacture of chemical
