crossed.

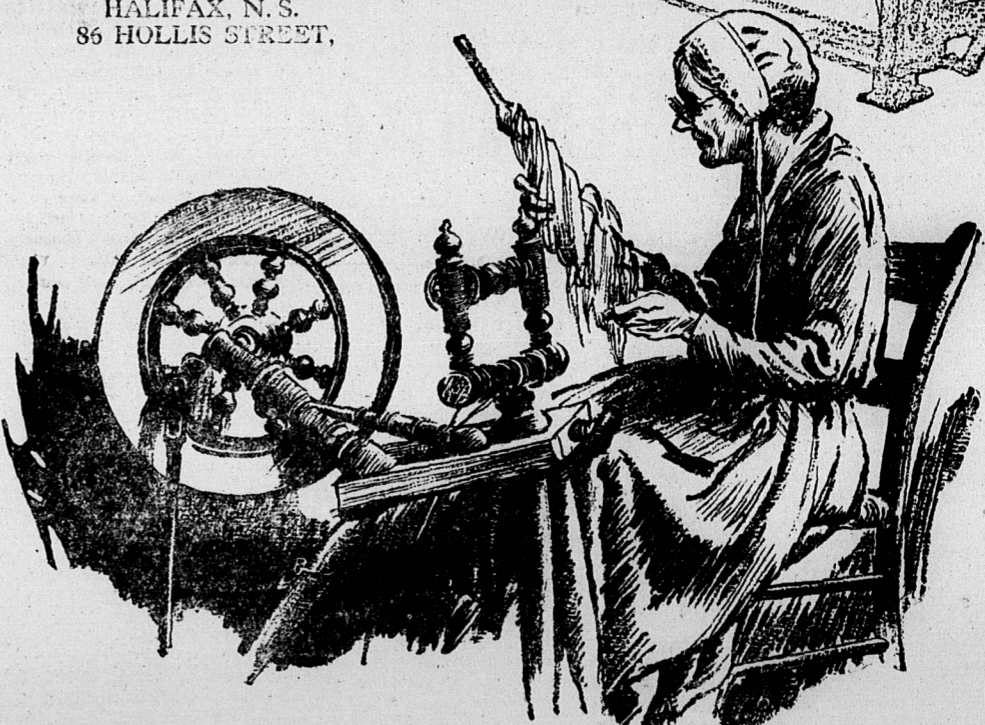
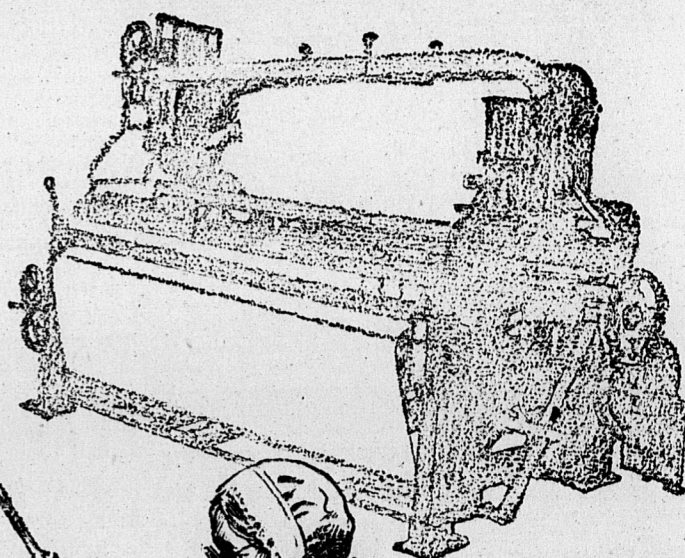
The new household servant—electricity—
