BORDEN IN BOSTON.

BOSTON, Mass., March 27.—That the task which confronted Washington and Hamilton in the construction days following 1784 was not unlike that which now confronts the statesmen of the British Empire was the declaration made recently by Robert Laird Borden, leader of the Conservative party in Canada, and member of Parliament for Halifax. Mr. Borden was speaking before the Boston Canadian Club.

Mr. Borden reminded his hearers that the British Empire, as at present constituted, is of very recent development. It was not until after 1850, he said, that real development began in its constitutional relations.

In concluding his address Mr. Borden advocated an adequate celebration in a few years of a centenary of peace between Great Britain and the United States. He declared that "Canada is inseparably united to the Great Empire which owes a proud allegiance to King Edward the peace-maker," but is also in many ways closely associated with "this glorious Republic."

In addition to Mr. and Mrs. Borden, a number of state officials, presidents of several Canadian Clubs of Canada and prominent former British citizens were guests of the club. In addition to Governor Weeks, of Connecticut, and Governor Quimby, of New Hampshire, Dr. Neil Chatter, president of the Canadian Club of New York, welcomed Mr. Borden on behalf of the Canadian Clubs of the United States, and Lieut. Governor Frothingham, of Massachusetts, also expressed his pleasure that Mr. Borden had been able to visit the city.

ROOSEVELT OFFENDS EGYPTIANS.

CAIRO, March 27.—The Egyptian Government is rushing preparations to safeguard Theodore Roosevelt every moment he is in Cairo. Rumors of demonstrations against him by Nationalists have caused great alarm, and reports of a plot menacing the former president have reached the ears of the authorities. Col. Roosevelt's condemnation of the methods and ideals of the Nationalists have incensed the rank and file of that party and in some quarters the feeling is extremely bitter.

ANTWERP, March 27.—The American consulate here is trying to trace two New York white slave importers, who are believed to have shipped ninety women from Paris on sailing steamers. A British and Canadian ports are watched and the American and Canadian authorities have been notified.

ANTI-TYPHOID VACCINE.

PARIS, March 27.—Professor Elie Metchnikoff of the Pasteur Institute announced before the Academy of Sciences last night that he had succeeded in overcoming the principal obstacle to the preparation of an effective anti-typoid vaccine. This disease heretofore has been incurable to the lower animals, and Prof. Metchnikoff has now succeeded in inoculating monkeys with the typhoid germ. By this means he has been able to obtain exact symptoms, repeating accurate experiments on the action of his vaccines.

RUSSO-AUSTRIAN PACT.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 27.—The Government has formally communicated to foreign ministers its announcement of the agreement reported by Russia and Austria. A statement issued by the press says that the recent negotiations between St. Petersburg and Vienna had satisfactory results, showing that Russia and Austria are in complete agreement in political principles as regard Balkan affairs, and that the normal diplomatic relations between the two governments have been restored.

PORTUGUESE COAST STORM SWEEPED.

LONDON, March 27.—A terrible storm has lashed the Portuguese coast, and 35 men are known to have been drowned. Four fishing boats went down, according to reports received here today. Many others have not been heard from and it is feared many more lives have been lost. Several bodies have already been washed ashore.

ELKINS, W. Va., March 27.

The Hambleton Tanning Company's plant at Hambleton, one of the largest in the state, was destroyed by fire yesterday at a loss estimated at \$1,000,000. The firm employed 300 men.

PORTLAND, Me., March 27.

Excessively warm today was the warmest March day on record at the Portland weather bureau. The maximum temperature was 76 degrees. The record is 78 degrees on March 20, 1903.

ROOSEVELT TO BE KAISER'S GUEST.

BERLIN, March 27.—Ex-President Roosevelt is to be the emperor's personal guest at the palace in Berlin from May 12 to May 15.
