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Lively Debate On Teachers Bill

Government Member, forced to withdraw untrue statement, talks himself into other difficulties.

Legislative Assembly, March 26. The House met at 3:15 p. m. with Deputy Speaker, Mr. Foley in the chair.

Answers to a number of questions were tabled, also the annual reports of the trustees of Falconwood Hospital and the Provincial Infirmary, and the Department of Agriculture.

Mr. Saville presented a petition from the Mayor and Town Council of Georgetown for an Act to amend the Town's Incorporation Act. A bill in accordance with the petition was received and read.

Premier Campbell intimated that it was the intention to bring down the Budget on Saturday morning. The reading was given to a bill to amend the credit union societies Act.

On motion of Hon. Mr. McGuigan the House resumed committee reading of the bill to amend the Public Schools Act.

The text of the section dealing with the balance of high school trustees appeared in yesterday's Guardian. The amendment moved by Premier Campbell provided for the following minimum salary payments to high school teachers:

In Grade 12 schools, \$1,000, of which amount \$800 shall be paid by the provincial treasury, the balance by the district.

In Grade 12 schools, \$1,200; \$950 to be paid by the provincial treasury, the balance by the district.

In addition to the statutory salary, the provincial treasury to pay an amount equal to twice the amount of the district over and above the amount required to be raised and paid under the foregoing sections.

Dr. MacMillan's Amendment Hon. Dr. MacMillan, leader of the Opposition, moved an amendment to the Premier's amendment, which would provide for the full payment by the provincial treasury of the salaries of teachers employed in Grade 12 schools.

Premier Campbell said he had found reference in the minutes of the Board of Education to the agreement with Summerside High School. The minute read: "Agreed that the Minister of Education and the Superintendent confer with Summerside representatives of the School Board with a view of starting the work of Grade 12 towards which the Board of Education was not in a position to provide an extra teacher, the success of which would determine the advisability of undertaking the work of Grade 12."
