

HUNDREDS WERE HELD ENSLAVED

South Sea Islanders Practical Slaves in Guatemala Eighteen Years Set Free and Sent to Their Homes.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 17—(Special)—Nineteen survivors of several hundred South Sea Islanders kidnapped eighteen years ago from their native strand and sold into slavery among the coffee plantations of Guatemala, arrived yesterday.

REBELS KILLED BY TROOPS

MANILA, July 16—Lieuts. Burr and Whitney, commanding detachments of the constabulary, attacked and stormed Cota on the island of Mindanao, which was occupied by the outlaw Uyas on Friday last. Fourteen of the outlaws were killed and two guns captured. Lieut. Burr was slightly wounded, and one private was seriously wounded.

RESOURCES OF THIS PROVINCE

OTTAWA, July 16.—The official report of the quantity and value of Prince Edward Island's various agricultural products, for last year, from the report of the commissioner of agriculture for 1907, is as follows:—

Table listing agricultural products and their values: Potatoes, 4,000,000 bushels; Oats, 8,000,000 bushels; Mixed grain, 500,000 bushels; Hay, 150,000 tons; Potatoes, 4,000,000 bushels; Poultry, 4,000,000 bushels; Eggs, 250,000 bushels.

The oats crop is certainly underestimated, says a writer in The West-Canada, and may safely be put down at 10,000,000 bushels. Much of these oats weigh 40 to 42 pounds to the measured bushel. Oats grain is very free from weeds, and this is land is specially well adapted for growing seed-grain.
