### THE LIQUOR QUESTION

(Continued from page two)

Country which has had centuries of experience in the traffic. In the old land it is managed by a Board of Commissioners, and there the house is licensed, not the man, or the occupant. This has the effect of greatly increasing in value of the property licensed, and the occupant has to pay a very high license. The greatly increased value of the licensed property, together with the high license makes the holder of it the very best check there can be on the illicit sale of liquors by unlicensed people; and the same conditions make the license holder very careful to comply with the strict rules enforced by the Commissioners.

I would suggest that our Local Legislature appoint three Commissioners, say one from each county, whose duty it shall be to select the houses to be licensed, and then formulate very strict rules for the guidance of those licensed, the breach of any of those rules to be followed by the cancellation of the license. The great loss in the value of the property, by the loss of the license, will insure the strict observance of the law.

Inspectors, men of good standing, should be appointed to make frequent tests of the liquors sold, at unknown times to the dealers. At the present time the cause of so much drunkenness which was talked about at recent meetings here, and throughout the Province, is that the dealers who know they are breaking the laws, import the cheapest liquors they can get, as they are liable to be confiscated if caught in the act. Consequently our people are being poisoned, it is the quality, and not the quantity, that does the mischief—this I repeat!

I think it the duty of our Government to take the matter seriously into consideration as soon as possible.

The last five scores he has made on the range speak well for the veteran's steadiness and sureness of aim, being 92, 94 (twice), 96 and 98 pts.; a grand performance for one of his years, the third highest score on Saturday was made by Professor Barlow, who scored 95 pts., Mr. W. S. Louson coming next with 94 pts., and Lieut. Ritchie with 92 pts., while Mr. W. Davison occupied the post of honor with a score of 80 points. It may be remarked that the enthusiasm which took these shots out in such weather is highly commendable and the value of practice shooting under all conditions is not to be underestimated.
