TRURO, November 6.—The famous lay-riding case which was tried before Stipendiary Crowe in May last and judgment given against the joyriders, was reviewed today on an appeal and the case is now being tried before Judge Chipman.

LORD ROBERTS SCORED.

LONDON, Nov. 6.—Lord Roberts' speech at Manchester continues to attract comment. Ever since its delivery two weeks ago, the Daily Mail has published the summary of the speech in every issue.

The International Arbitration League, however, has carried a resolution denouncing Roberts' effort, declaring he speaks for a small section of fanatical militarists, whose violent language measures their failure to place the yoke of conscription on the shoulders of the British people.

A gathering of the German colony at Manchester on Saturday evening condemned the speech, and begged their friends in Germany to understand that Lord Roberts' words did not reflect the opinion of the great majority of Englishmen.

WILL THIS REDUCE THE PRICE OF HARD COAL.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—The Interstate Commerce Commission has issued an order reducing after January 1 freight rates on anthracite coal from the interior of Pennsylvania to Tlewater (N. J.) which may be a forerunner of other reductions. The commission declared in favor of a 98 cent rate.

ANNOUNCE A CURE FOR TUBERCULOSIS.

BERLIN, Nov. 6.—At a meeting of the Berlin Medical Society today Dr. Frederick Friedmann announced the discovery of what he believed to be a practical cure for every form of tuberculosis. He exhibited cured patients and declared that he treated 682 cases by his method with almost invariably complete cures. Prominent physicians testified to successes by this method in their own practice. Dr. Friedmann injects living tubercule bacilli which have been rendered benevolent.

MURDER AND SUICIDE.

ALSTLAD, N. H., Nov. 6.—Frank Kidder, an insane man, shot and fatally wounded his aged aunt, Miss Mary Richardson, slightly injured his uncle, Martin L. Richardson, and committed suicide here today and neighbors were about to overpower him. Mr. Richardson was elected to the Legislature yesterday by the Democratic Party. Kidder was released from an asylum some time ago and had been living with his father, E. P. Kidder. The shooting occurred while calling at the Kidder home. Frank Kidder was apparently pleased to see them, but during their conversation he suddenly drew a revolver and began firing. Miss Richardson, who is seventy-six years old, was wounded in the abdomen and is not expected to recover.

TO TAX BACHELORS.

DENVER, Col., Nov. 6.—Denver bachelors will either be forced into a life of martial bliss or slavery as the case may be, or else pay a ransom equal to the price of a marriage license, if a bill offered by Aldermen Ford and Mcmon, the bachelor members of the Board of Aldermen, is passed. The bill, which has received the title of "single tax," provides that all male voters of the city who do not contribute to the support of a family must either get a wife or else pay a tax of \$2. It will be introduced for passage at the next meeting of the Board.

WANT A RETURN TO THE SEVEN MEN HOCKEY TEAM.

MONTREAL, November 6.—The only amendment to be brought up at the annual meeting of the National Hockey Association so far is the return to the seven man team. Ottawa will have no stone unturned to have this amendment carried, while both of the Toronto teams are with them in their fight.
