DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

At sixty-six years of age and near five years since he drove a horse in a race, Fred Cameron celebrated his re-entrance into the game by staking a win with Heatherbell 2.10 in straight heats at Northam.

It must have been a surprise to most horsemen when they picked up the Guardian on Thursday to find that Dermot 2.04 1/2 had taken Toll Gate into camp in the Free-for-All race on Wednesday, but to those who are acquainted with his past performances the win does not come as a shock.

Dermot was raced as a three-year-old and took a record of 2.07 1/2 and won consistently over half-mile tracks. As a four and five-year-old he was not so impressive. Two years ago Carl Dill picked him up at the New York auction for a song and balancing him did away with the hoppers. At once Dermot became a winner, constantly beating the very best of the free-for-alls on occasion and very rarely tasting defeat himself.

Charles Ballard looking around for a free-for-aller that would not cost too much money fastened on Dermot. Negotiations were carried on for some time until finally a take it or leave it offer brought a responsive yes and Dermot was shipped to North Sydney, where he was 1-1-1 over Toll Gate, Calumet, Brownie and The Great Guy, all horses with faster records, but it must be remembered that their records were taken over a mile track while his record of 2.04 1/2 was taken over a half-mile track.

Dermot not only won his race but he also lowered the track record of 1.09 1/2 to 2.09 1/2 in the second heat in which he was very closely pressed by Toll Gate. A telegram to the writer from Charlie, the evening of the race said: "Dermot won in three straight broke track record over a rotten track." As the track belongs to Charlie it is perfectly O. K. for him to call it rotten, but we would not like to so christen it ourselves.

Well, the writer is very pleased indeed to see the good Sydney sportsman with a winner and there is also another angle to the win. It is this; with Toll Gate out in front and no opposition, free-for-alls would lack appeal, but now that Dermot can take his measure at least once in a while and Calumet, Brownie can beat him for position in a heat, things are looking up in the free-for-all game.

H. M. Sweeney was compensated to some extent for his defeat in the Free-for-All at Sydney by winning the 2-22 Trot and Pace with Calumet Bee 2.13 1/2, now 2.13 1/2, made in the first heat of that race. Calumet Bee is a trotter and a mighty good one. Good judges of form say that Dermot will be before the season is over and Charlottetown is the place selected for that tab to be placed on.

Tom Holmes pulled out his excuse book yesterday morning when we asked why he did not win with Lusty Frisco at Northam. "Page 32 says the track was hard and my horse was carrying too much weight."

There may be a lot in what Tom says and with a hunk taken off his toe and a few ounces less weight in the shoes Lusty may be able to head the redoubtable Heatherbell.

By the way, Morning Express did not race up to expectations although he was second in the fastest heat, trotted in 2.12. It may be that lack of competition is the cause and Wednesday's race may key him up and put him in trim to trot as we would expect him to, namely, around 2.10.

Where is Patrick Direct, 2.07, (record made at Montague last August)? We have not noticed him in any summaries for weeks. There was a rumour that he had some lame after racing in Sydney July 1st. We hope this is not true as the 2.15 class with him will not be nearly as interesting.

Guy the Tramp still keeps in the limelight. At Sturbridge, Mass., a half-mile track July 19th he won a heat in 2.08 1/2, and at Pascoag, R.I. made a new track record trotting of 2.08. W. C. Crummer as remarked before, is a very versatile man.

Another winner the same day was Margaret's Sun, time 2.10 1/2. Margaret's Sun is a daughter of Kalmuc, 2.15 1/2 out of Margaret Dillon 1.58 1/2.

The fastest three-year-old trotter over a half-mile track this season is Countess Zabetta, a bay filly by Guy Day. She won at Sturbridge, Mass., taking a record of 2.07 1/2 and is now considered one of the important contenders for the Hambleton Stake, although Greyhound whose record of 2.02 1/2 taken at the Toronto Grand Circuit mile track meeting is far and away the favorite. She will meet her first severe test at Rockingham to-day when she starts against Greyhound 2.02 1/2 and other stars in a \$5,500 stake.

Honeymoon H. 2.09 1/2 is now tied with Miss Pierette 2.09 1/2 as a producer of 2.10 trotting foals, War Tide, son of Honeymoon H. having taken a record of 2.10 at Lexington, July 19th.

The Grand Circuit meeting at Rockingham track, N.H. gets under way to-day and will be continued until the 10th. The program is a most attractive one assuring spectacular racing on each of the seven afternoons of the meeting. All the big Grand Circuit stables will converge at Rockingham, also the leading New England half-mile track stables. The sponsor is Paul Bowser, wrestling promoter and harness horse enthusiast.

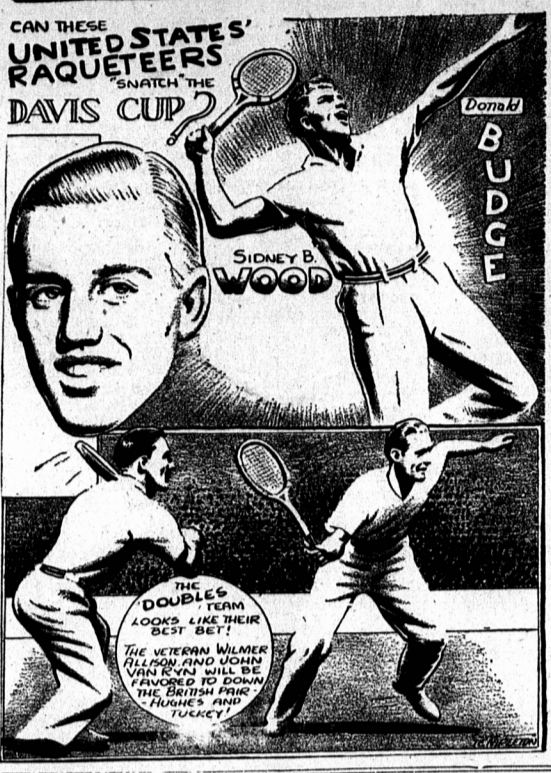
The men's doubles, Young and Peterson vs. Coyle and Hennessey was halted by rain in the first set, the games being 3-3.

WILSON AND O'HARA IN N.B. FINALS

Ontario and Nova Scotia Stars Dominate N. B. Courts.

(C. F. by Guardian's Special Wire) FREDERICTON, N. B., Aug. 2—Ontario and Nova Scotia net stars forced New Brunswick players out of the running today in semi-final men's and women's singles matches at the New Brunswick tennis tournament.

Ross Wilson, Toronto, will face J. W. O'Hara, Ottawa, for the ladies' title in an issue between two Haligonians—Mrs. F. V. Woodbury and Mrs. H. F. Jones.

The semi-final stage of the mixed doubles had not been reached when play concluded this evening. Two thrilling men's singles matches were staged this afternoon in the semi-finals brackets as well as two of the best ladies' singles events ever seen at a New Brunswick tournament.

George Johnston, New Brunswick's no. 1 player in 1934, fell before the superior steadiness of O'Hara, Ottawa district champion, in straight sets but not before the Fredericton player had shown himself as one of the most improved players to be developed in this province in years.
