S' Side Council Reports Surplus

Encouraging Financial Report Submitted At Annual Meeting Last Night.

The report of the Finance Committee was submitted at last night's annual meeting of the Town Council of Summerside by Mr. M. F. Schurman, acting chairman of the Committee.

In the absence of the chairman of the Finance Committee the Hon. L. M. McNeill, who has so faithfully filled this office, for the past few years, but who is unable to be with us tonight, his higher duties calling him elsewhere, the task of making this report falls on me, as a member of the Finance Committee, and I will endeavor to be as brief as possible.

It would be impossible, with the short time at our disposal, to go into all the details in connection with this report, but itemized accounts will be in the printers' hands in a very short time, and published in full as usual so that any ratepayer may receive a copy.

I propose, however, to deal more particularly with the Revenue and Expenditure for the year ending December 31, 1931. It affords me no little pleasure to say to Your Worship and to the members of this Council Board that the total ordinary Revenue exceeds the total ordinary Expenditure by \$8,680.46. The itemized published statements as audited and recorded on the Town books will confirm this and are as follows:

During the year which has just closed the Council has laid down permanent concrete streets at the following costs:— Continuation of Central Street at a cost of \$ 6,165.05 Green and Summer Streets at a cost of 26,283.97 Water Street, East, at a cost of 17,413.99

In order to finance and pay this large amount it was necessary to arrange for an overdraft at the Bank of Nova Scotia, and at the close of the year 1931 this overdraft amounted to \$21,463.09. The taxpayer will ask, and rightly so, how we propose to take care of this overdraft. First, I may say that in October of 1930 the Town borrowed from the Trustees of the Prince County Hospital \$10,000.00. During the summer of 1931 the Trustees asked for the payment of this loan, and the Town gave them a cheque for this large amount, plus the interest. This loan was shown in last year's financial statement, but was paid out of the 1931 Town Revenue, thus increasing the overdraft to the amount of \$10,463.09.

In addition to the above explanation regarding the overdraft, we have the following collectable amounts:— Government Grant on Water Street East, payable at once \$ 7,500.00 Amount due from Property Owners on Water Street East 4,175.00 Amount due from Property Owners on Central Street 1,400.00 Amount due from Property Owners on Green & Summer Sts. 6,000.00

You will notice by the above statement that with the amounts due, the bank overdraft is pretty well taken care of, as well as the Hospital loan being paid in full.

During the past few years expenditures by municipalities all over Canada have been excessive, and in many cases very little to show in the way of permanent improvements. This, however, is not the case with Summerside. We have ample evidence of permanent improvements, and I am confident there is not five percent of the citizens of Summerside who will be willing to go back to the old methods. We must have confidence in our Town as well as our ability to solve our many problems as they present themselves, and co-operation among the citizens. With world depression as it is being felt even here our borrowing must stop at least for the present because there is no urgent need for it. There never was a time when it was as easy to carry on the affairs of the Town as it will be for the year 1932. Our ratepayers are taxed perhaps the lowest of any Town, having all modern improvements, of its size in Canada. There is absolutely no need to increase the taxes, and still the excellent service given our citizens can be continued. Today with Water Street, Central Street, Summer Street and Green Street paved, the cost of maintaining streets with our new tractor and paver will be more than cut in two. With this saving and some others there is no reason why considerable paving could not be done this year and paid from ordinary revenue without in any way increasing the debt. This would not only help out during the unemployment period, but we would be spending our money for something permanent. The healthy condition of the Water and Sewerage System, as shown in the financial statement and by the large amount of money they have been able to hand to the Town, as well as the many extensions made to the service, is most encouraging.

I cannot allow this opportunity to pass without paying a tribute to our Town Clerk, Mr. H. J. Massy, whose thirty-five years of faithful service has greatly helped to place Summerside in the enviable financial position that she now occupies.

The Champion Boy Piper Harold Sutherland, Westville, N. S.

The old mining town of Westville in Pictou County is very proud of its young piper, Harold Sutherland, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. V. Sutherland. Last summer Harold's splendid performance on the bagpipes won for him a ten days trip to New York financed by Col. Walter Scott, President of the Scottish Societies in the United States.

Harold had the honor of being the first piper in America, perhaps in the whole world, to play over television radio and have his picture cast upon the receiving sets of television listeners.

This youthful musical prodigy received much publicity in the United States press, and while in New York he hobnobbed with such American celebrities as Babe Ruth, Colonel Lindbergh and others. He was put in one of the best suites in one of New York's most fashionable hotels, where he was besieged with American newspapermen. He told them of being taught by Pipe Major Holmes and in his earlier years by Piper John White of Westville, both of whom today are basking in the reflected glory from their young pupil.

Harold, who was only thirteen years of age had the rare distinction of winning the Col. Walter Scott medal in 1931. It is pleasing news to know that this lad is coming to Charlottetown and will play in the Burns Concert to be held next week.
