## Brilliant Can. Lawyer Passes At 74

MONTREAL, Oct. 15—(CP)—Aime Geoffrion, recognized as one of the most brilliant constitutional lawyers Canada ever produced, died at his home early today in his 74th year. He had been ill since a serious operation last May 20.

Mr. Geoffrion's fame was well known in Great Britain and the United States, as well as across the Dominion.

Brilliance in debate, a comprehensive knowledge of the law, a sense of the dramatic, all were among his outstanding qualities. He was highly cultured, a wide reader and an authoritative speaker on almost any subject.

Mr. Geoffrion was only 31 when he served as junior counsel for Canada in the Alaska boundary arbitration of 1903-04. Although the decision was against Canada, the fame of the young Montreal lawyer was already launched.

He acted as counsel frequently for the Dominion and Quebec governments and it was not unusual for both to approach him when a legal case, involving both governments, arose.

Mr. Geoffrion also became a familiar figure in the commercial world. He was president of the Catell Food Products Co., vice-president and director of the Aluminum Company of Canada, and a director of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company and a number of other organizations.

He was born in Montreal Nov. 13, 1872, of a distinguished family. His father, C. A. Geoffrion, K. C., was minister without portfolio in the Laurier Cabinet. His mother, the former Bullele Dorion, was a daughter of the late Sir Antoine Aime Dorion, Minister of Justice in the Mackenzie Cabinet and former Chief Justice of the Court of Appeal in Montreal.

Mr. Geoffrion was educated at St. John's School, St. Mary's College and McGill University. He was graduated in law in 1893 and became a King's Counsel in 1903. For 15 years he was connected

A group of books and pamphlets dealing with international problems went on display yesterday in the Legislative and Public Library which offers this feature as part of its work in developing the use to which the library can be put by citizens.

In the words of R. M. Fowler, President of the Canadian Institute of International Affairs "Canada has today an opportunity for leadership in world affairs that comes seldom to a nation of twelve million people. But to be able to grasp this opportunity there must be more than action by our political leaders. They must be supported by the informed and thoughtful public opinion of Canadians generally. What is needed are facts—solid ground on which the law can have its chance. This study and collection of facts is the objective of the research activities of the Institute. When the facts have been gathered the best test of the truth they may suggest is their power to get themselves accepted in the competition of the market."

The Canadian Institute of International Affairs was founded in 1928 by a few men who realized that a non-political and unofficial organization would be useful in helping Canadians understand the complexities of foreign relations. Today, the Institute has 2,000 members in 24 branches from Halifax to Victoria. It is in constant touch for informational purposes with similar independent institutes in 14 other countries. The Institute is financed by members' fees and contributions, and by the contributions of non-members and foundations such as the Rockefeller and Carnegie.

Included in this current display of C.I.I.A. publications are pamphlets in the "Behind the Headlines" series dealing in a simple and concise manner with questions of current interest such as "Atomic Energy and World Government" and "Divided China." Also included are Contemporary Affairs pamphlets providing a more detailed discussion of the subject treated: "Canada at Geneva" and "How We Govern Ourselves" are two of the titles; books published by the C. I. I. A. and the new quarterly, International Journal, as well as new books and pamphlets issued by affiliated organizations as the Royal Institute of International Affairs, London, England, the Institute of Pacific Relations, New York, of which the C. I. I. A. is the Canadian Council, and other Institutes of International Affairs in Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and India.

## Pleads Not Guilty On Spy Charges

OTTAWA, Oct. 15—(CP)—A jury of men was sworn today and proceeded to hear in a preliminary trial of the conspiracy trial of Eric George Adams, former official in several government branches, before Chief Justice J.C. McRuer of the Ontario Supreme Court.

While Mrs. Adams, an attractive redhead, sat next to the prisoners' dock and occasionally smiled up at him, her husband pleaded not guilty in a firm, steady voice to a charge of conspiring with 22 Canadians and Russian Embassy officials to gather and communicate confidential information for Russia.

The Crown alleges that the accused committed this breach of the Official Secrets Act in the wartime years when he was employed successively by the Wartime Requirements Board, the Foreign Exchange Control Board, and the Industrial Development Bank and was a member of several important government committees.

The jury, sequestered after 47 members of a panel of 116 had been called, first heard the testimony of Igor Gouzenko, 27, former Russian Embassy cipher clerk and star Crown witness, who was still on the stand at the afternoon adjournment.

The defence gave notice of objections to Gouzenko as a witness on the grounds that his evidence is hearsay evidence.

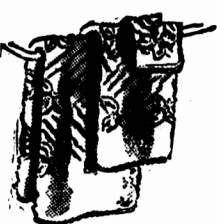

## Government Officials Aboard Aquitania

HALIFAX, Oct. 15—(CP)—Several Canadian Government officials travelling to the United Kingdom on official business are among passengers embarking on the Aquitania tonight. The ship was scheduled to sail about midnight.

The big liner, which has set up a record for the number of troops carried during the First and Second World Wars, will enter dry-dock for a seven-week overhaul and refit after arrival in Southampton.

Brig. J. M. Melville, chairman of the Canadian Pensions Board, is on his way overseas to check on Canadian servicemen remaining in the British Isles. He is accompanied by Brig. W. P. Warner of the Department of Veterans Affairs.

F. P. Varcoe, Deputy Minister of Justice for Canada, also is travelling on an undisclosed mission. The family of Hon. Norman A. Robertson, recently appointed Canadian High Commissioner in London, will sail to join him.

Other prominent passengers include: J. J. Pitman, managing director of Sir Isaac Pitman and sons, and Hon. Mrs. Pitman; Mother Superior Katherine Joseph; H. Ruffin of the French Economic Mission, and his family; Sir Cecil Kitchin and Dr. D. G. North, senior officials of the United Nations; E. C. McLeod, general manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia in London, and Mrs. McLeod.

Also aboard is the delegation of the American Federation of Labor to the British Trades Union Congress, and a party of British delegates who have been attending the International Labor Organization convention in Montreal.
