BURRELL JOHNSON PLANT BURNED

Yarmouth's Worst Fire. Gasoline Caused It. Loss \$100,000. Insurance \$89,000.

YARMOUTH, March 4—(Special)—Probably the worst fire in the history of Yarmouth occurred this morning when the greater portion of the buildings and plant of the Burrell Johnson Iron Company was destroyed.

The fire broke out shortly before eight o'clock and in a little over an hour the machine shop, foundry, moulding department, stove warehouse and offices with their contents were destroyed.

LEGISLATURE OF YESTERDAY

More Returns. Mr. Laird Elected Deputy Speaker. Some Bills Passed. Mr. Cox and Others Discuss the Fisheries.

The House opened at 12.15. In reply to Mr. Laird Hon. Mr. Cumiskey said there had been a sale of the bridge on the road leading from Bay View to Stanley Bridge at what seemed a low figure.

HON. MR. RICHARDS also tabled some returns. PREMIER HASZARD in reply to Mr. Dobbie said it was not in the public interest to bring down the correspondence relating to an Experimental Farm.

AFTERNOON SESSION. The Speaker took the chair at 5 o'clock. The bill to incorporate the D. McKenzie Company, limited, was read a third time and passed.

MR. COX moved a resolution asking the federal Government to appoint a Commission to deal with the Atlantic and Gulf fisheries of Eastern Canada along the lines of the Scotch fishery commission.

MR. MCDONALD, A. J. said the matter was of interest and importance. It had been long since this House had a discussion on it, as it had been largely relegated to the Dominion. The late Hon. Duvour had asked him for suggestions as to the lobster fishery.
