SUBMARINE F-4 HAS BEEN LOCATED.

MONOLULUI, March 29.—The submarine F-4, has been located outside the harbor, it was announced tonight. Portions of the superstructure have been brought to the surface. The salvage California will lift moorings, and an attempt will be made to lift the submarine.

INDIA'S POSITION IS SOUND IN EVERY WAY.

LONDON, March 29.—(Through Reuters's Ottawa agency.)—A special despatch from Delhi, India, says: "In the course of the Budget debate in the Council, the Indian members unanimously congratulated Sir W. S. Meyer, the Minister of Finance, upon his showing of the finance of the country and expressed gratification at the splendid conduct of the Indian troops in the field as attested by the commanding officer.

Baron Hardinge, the Viceroy, referred to the convincingly interesting soundness and strength of the Indian financial position, which enabled the heavy responsibility of the war to be fully discharged. The strain, he said, was now sensibly relaxed, but if further burdens were to be imposed, India was ready to meet them.

WILL SELL GASOLINE AT THREE CENTS A GALLON.

KANSAS CITY, March 29.—Louis Bond Cherry will apply for patents for a process of which, he says, it is possible to market gasoline at a profit of three cents a gallon. "I can take 10,000 gallons of 330 gravity distillate and convert it into 11,900 gallons of gasoline of 65 gravity," he said. "By my process, all the volatile parts of the crude oil are turned into gasoline at any desired gravity, and it takes less than one cubic foot of natural gas to a gallon of gasoline produced and not to exceed five kilowatts of electricity for the conversion of 10,000 gallons of crude oil a day. This will make the cost of conversion less than three-fourths of a cent per gallon."

Cherry's process is an electro-chemical one, and differs from all others in that he uses nothing in the conversion of oil to gasoline but heat, pressure, natural gas and electricity.
