**DEATH FOLLOWS MISUSE OF FUNDS**

BOMBAY, Dec. 2.—(Special).—The sudden death of the managing director of the Indian Specie Bank, Mr. Chumal Sraiya, of heart failure on Saturday morning has been followed by another sensation.  
 His assistant informed Sir Vithaldas Thackerai, the bank's chairman and director, that the secretary used the bank's money for large silver operations in bogus names. Payments due on Saturday amounted to £16,000 (\$30,000), only half of which was found.  
 The bank, after a hurried meeting of the directors, applied to the court for an official liquidation, which was ordered. Accordingly the auditor will present his report in a fortnight.

The bank has a subscribed capital of £1,000,000 (\$5,000,000), half of which has been paid in. Losses on advances and advances on pearls are estimated at more than £200,000 (\$1,000,000). It is stated that Mr. Chumal paid the depositors more than £750,000 (\$3,750,000) in the course of the recent run.  
 Consternation is marked, for despite the run of last week and the revelations made in court, showing that the bank has sustained great losses, it is believed that Mr. Chumal was a financier of immense capacity. Hence the great interests concerned rallied round him, hoping that an adjustment would be possible satisfactory to all. It is now realized that there will be severe losses.

trious guests many onerous duties developed upon the princess. Despite these engagements, however, she was present at that time at the opening of a nursing home at the London Hospital and of the People's Palace at Mile End, while her royal highness and her daughters visited the Brompton Hospital and provided an entertainment for patients and nurses. The year 1888 brought her own silver wedding, the celebration of which, however, was quiet owing to the death of the two German Emperors. There was a reception at Marlborough House for friends, and in the evening a family dinner party. Among the many presents on the occasion were a silver statuette of Vera, the favorite horse of the Princess given by the Royal children to their mother, a silver model of the Imperial Institute from the City Corporation, and a casket from the ladies who had been the bridesmaids of the Princess. The Diamond Jubilee of Queen Victoria's Accession occurred in 1897, bringing with it another busy season for Her Royal Highness, who was present at all the State ceremonies, including the memorable procession through London to St. Paul's. It was on the thoughtful suggestion of the Princess that a dinner was provided for the destitute poor, who still remember with joy the historic celebration. But four years later the Royal Family and the Empire suffered an irreparable loss. Her Royal Highness stood in January, 1901, by the bedside of Queen Victoria and witnessed the passing away of the great and noble figure in English history. Through the death, which threw the nation into mourning, the Princess became Queen Alexandra. During the second half of the Nineteenth Century the foundations of Monarchy had been broadened and deepened in the affection of the nation, and there had been a remarkable growth of the Imperial spirit which had led to a new conception of Empire. At the Accession of King Edward there was a natural tendency not only to look back on the glorious age of Queen Victoria but to wonder whether the high level that had been sustained in the national life was capable of being still further maintained. King Edward from the first upheld the best traditions of the Crown, and the success with which he brought the Throne into touch with all sections of the community for the advancement of social well-being was in no small degree due to the aid of Queen Alexandra, to whom all hearts went out. Nothing was more in coincidence with the desire of her Majesty than that the reign should be, as it was marked by a great increase of the had set a splendid example, ever since

she came among us. She therefore active spirit of benevolence which had been at work, and which she supported King Edward in taking the initiative in those branches which lent themselves to his influence, especially in all that concerned the care of the sick, the cure of disease, and the amelioration of the condition of the poor. In 1905, it may be remembered, Queen Alexandra, touched by the sufferings of the unemployed throughout the country, started a fund which, known by her name, soon exceeded £150,000, and did much to alleviate the distress of the winter then beginning. There have been rulers who have striven to be feared for their power rather than loved for their goodness. King Edward and Queen Alexandra chose the better part, with the result that to-day her Majesty is the recipient of the sincerest marks of popular esteem.

**AFFECTION OF THE PEOPLE**

Queen Alexandra has during half a century taken the duties of her exalted position in earnest and with complete success, and has done so by the simplest of all acts to those endowed with the gift for its exercise. Her Majesty has through her sympathy and her temperament won the love of the nation, and by manifesting in all circumstances a complete confidence in the people has taught them to repose in her a trust equally implicit. The affection of the people indeed, has been no small part of the happiness of her Majesty, who has identified herself with their joys and their sorrows. That that sympathy is reciprocated was made abundantly manifest at the death, among others, of the Duke of Clarence, Queen Louise, King Christian, King Frederick VIII., of Denmark, and above all King Edward. When in 1902 King Edward was overtaken by the critical illness which led to the postponement of the Coronation, her Majesty took her stand once more by the bedside of his Majesty. She passed through that period of anxiety and endured that trial with a fortitude that increased the regard in which the nation cherished her. The demise of the King ten years later brought an abiding grief, and the sense of the loss was felt in common by the whole of the people, but that partnership in bereavement served to increase the public consciousness of the bond that existed between her Majesty and the nation. That she was deeply impressed by the universal expression of condolence was made manifest by her memorable letter, in which she said: "From the depth of my poor broken heart I wish to express to the whole nation and our kind people we love so well my deep heart-felt thanks for all their touching sympathy in my overwhelming sorrow and unspeakable anguish." These sincere and beautifully simple words went straight to the popular heart. It was as a woman that she had revealed herself in her letter to the people who loved her most of all for her intense womanliness. Ever since she came to England she has adopted this country as her own, and has been in the truest sense adopted by it. "There are," she once said, "some Princesses and reigning Queens, are there not,
