Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

—Six months residence upon, and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of a homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties: Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 30 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties: Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 30 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of rough scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

98th Anniversary of Oddfellows

Time with its fleeting movements has again brought around another year in the history of Oddfellowship around the world. We are again at the point when a general review of the years work is made and a comparison drawn between other years' accomplishments.

During the past year this Order has been called upon to initiate many movements in connection with its work that were never thought of in days that are gone.
