COMMISSION APPOINTED

The Government has lost no time in carrying out its assurance that there would be a full and complete inquiry into the charges made by the officials of the Temperance Alliance of this Province against the Prosecutors and Magistrates who acted in certain prohibition cases that were instituted on behalf of the Alliance a few months ago and came to an abrupt termination. At the recent session of the Legislature a Bill was introduced by the Government and passed, empowering the appointment of Commissioners to inquire into any public matter, and armed with this authority, the Executive Council at its meeting on Saturday appointed His Honor Judge McLeod, of Summerside, Commissioner to inquire into the charges made by the Temperance Alliance.

SOURIS BOARD OF TRADE REORGANIZED

After existing in a languishing condition for some years past the Souris Board of Trade took to itself a new lease of life, on April 30th, when a number of the business, professional and leading men of Souris, met to reorganize this institution, and also to hear the report of their delegates, who in conjunction with the other Boards of Trade of the Province waited on Messrs Hayes and Storey of the Intercolonial Railway to endeavour to secure better freight rates and train arrangements than at present. —CHURCHMEN IN FAVOR OF DIVORCE REFORM

LONDON, May 2.—The Lower House of Convocation of Canterbury Friday discussed the attitude of the Church of England toward divorce. The Bishop of Southampton moved a resolution expressing the opinion that there should be one standard of morality for men and women and equality of treatment by the law. The present state of the law, the Bishop said, was barbarous in its treatment of women. The dignity of woman was as great as the dignity of man, and the insult involved as great to woman as to man. If there was to be divorce at all, that belief should be as readily available for woman as for man. Canon Wood opposed the motion. As a matter of sin, he said, the offense was the same, but, dealt with as a matter of social justice, the women's offense was the greater. The resolution was carried.

—EARNEST W. WOODSIDE DEAD.—The Boston Globe of April 16th, says:—Ex-Representative Earnest W. Woodside a widely-known attorney, died yesterday afternoon at his residence, 35 West Eagle St., East Boston, after an illness of three months. Mr. Woodside was a member of the law firm of Torey & Woodside and served in the Legislature in 1908 from Ward 1. Mr. Woodside was born in Alberton, Prince Edward Island, Feb. 3, 1874. He came to East Boston when a child of 4 years. His education was received at the Chapman Grammar School, Boston Latin School and Boston University Law School, from which he was graduated in 1899. In 1902 he was vice president and in 1903 president of the Ward Republican Club. He served in the Common Council in 1905, 1906 and 1907. Mr. Woodside was a member of the East Boston Bar Association, the Suffolk Bar Association, the East Boston Cricket Club, Mt. Tabor Lodge, A. F. & A. M., Zenith Lodge I. O. O. F., and the Knights of Pythias. He leaves a wife, Mrs. Sarah Woodside; his mother, Mrs. Annie Woodside; two sisters, Mrs. N. D. Logan of Dorchester, Mrs. William T. Hunter of East Boston and four brothers, Guy L. of Winthrop and N. Morrison, William and Austin Woodside of East Boston. The funeral was held at the house Friday afternoon.

—BOARD OF TRADE.—A special meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade was held in the Council Chamber Thursday night for the purpose of discussing the votes of the Telephone Co. The President Dr. McLeod, in an opening the meeting explained the misunderstanding between the Drug Co., Cor. Great George & Kent telephone Co. and its subscribers as MEM. to the recent increase in votes to

some subscribers. After a few remarks by Mr. McLeod, K. C. Mr. Moore, Supt. of Telephone Co., was called upon. He explained that on the extension of the agreement in 1906 between the government and his Co. the rates were fixed which in the case of Summerside called for a rate of \$30.00 for an individual business line, \$23.00 for a party business line, \$23.00 for an individual private line and \$18.00 for a party private line, at that time the Company had lots of capacity and many who at that time signed agreements for party lines were put on an individual line. But now the Company on account of the increased numbers of subscribers they could no longer make this concession, as a result a re-adjustment had to be made, and subscribers were asked to sign new contracts, as a result of which a number of subscribers in fact almost 75 per cent. of them were getting a class of service to which they were not entitled, and all that the Company were now doing was the placing of all subscribers on an equal footing according to the service they paid for. He explained that at present perhaps the class of service was not up to the standard owing to lack of capacity but announced that it was the intention of the Company to spend about \$20,000 in Summerside in improving the service. One of the proposed improvements being the installation of a most up-to-date switch board, besides decided improvements in the lines. The matter was further discussed by Messrs. A. C. Saunders, Neil McLeod, H. T. Holman and others. On motion of Mr. H. T. Holman, seconded by Dr. Jardine, a committee consisting of the president, Mayor Saunders and Neil McLeod were appointed to obtain a copy of the agreement referred to and to ascertain the different rate in vogue prior to 1906, after which meeting adjourned to meet at call of the chair.—J.

—Her many friends will be pleased to learn that Mrs. Wm. E. Noonan, Albany, is improving after a severe attack of Conjestion of the lungs.

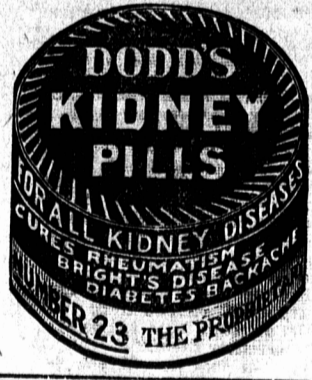
—Dr. Houston of Kensington has left to take a post graduate course in Montreal. During his absence Dr. John McFadyen will have charge of his patients.
