New Moratorium For Germany
PARIS, June 14.—(AP)—Hope that British and French views on the pending Lausanne conference might be brought into focus appeared in diplomatic quarters to night on the eve of preliminary conversations between Premier Edouard Herriot and Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald of Great Britain.
It was the diplomatic consensus however, that the most likely outcome of the two premiers' weekend discussion would be an agreement for a new moratorium for Germany.
The Lausanne conference, scheduled for next Thursday, was called to find the answer to the Hoover moratorium, which expires on June 30, and must be replaced with some formula to keep the war debts and reparations books straight.
The belief that a new moratorium might be forthcoming was based partly on the fact that M. Herriot initiated the preliminary conference after talking the issue over with Lord Tyrrell, the British ambassador.

Great Growing Weather In West

(Special to the Guardian)

WINNIPEG, Man., June 14.—General optimism prevails over practically the whole of the grain growing areas in Western Canada as excellent growing weather has persisted since the last reports. Days have been warm and sunny with weather, beneficial showers, which in some districts verged on the torrential. Wheat is up from six to eight inches and in some districts is coming into shot blade. All crops are far ahead of this same time last year. Fall rye is heading out with straw about three feet in height.

In western sections where cut worm outbreaks were anticipated the heavy rains have apparently killed the majority of the developing grubs. In Manitoba however, grasshoppers have been hatching steadily and in some districts the supply of poison bait has hardly been sufficient to keep up with the demand, according to the weekly crop report of the Agricultural Department, Canadian National Railways.
