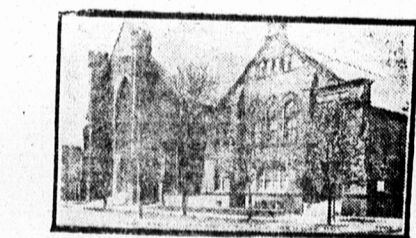

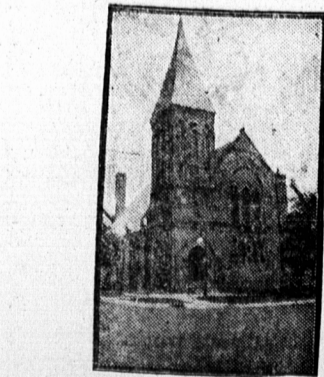

Canadian War Veterans To Attend Convention

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) BOSTON, Aug. 27—Plans for the reception and entertainment of 1,500 Canadian war veterans, expected to attend the annual convention of the New England Command of the Canadian Legion, were laid tonight at a committee meeting here presided over by Walter P. Archibald, native of Truro, N. S., and chairman of the command. The convention will open Sept. 11.

The Band of the First Brigade, Halifax Coastal Artillery with Captain A. L. Lomas, will come to Boston for the gathering of ex-servicemen. The committee tonight decided to invite Col. B. W. Roscoe, Kentville, N. S., president of the Nova Scotia command, to deliver the principal address at the annual banquet.

Capt. H. M. McNeil, M. C., a native of Sydney, N. S., and chairman of the memorial committee, announced a memorial service would be held in old King's Chapel here on Sept. 12.

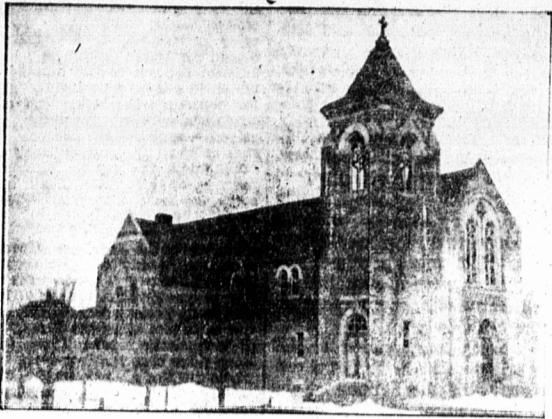

ST. JAMES CHURCH

On Tuesday, August 24th the parish of St. James, Georgetown, celebrated its one hundredth anniversary. His Excellency Rt. Rev. J. A. O'Sullivan offered up the Holy Mass to Almighty God in thanksgiving for the graces and blessings bestowed on the Parish. The Rev. D. P. Cronin, For. Augustus was High Priest, Rev. R. McKenzie, St. Dunstan's and Rev. M. J. Rooney of Carugan, were deacon and sub-deacon of honor. Rev. J. C. McDonald, D. D. and Rev. W. McCarville were deacon and sub-deacon of the Mass respectively. Rev. Louis Dougan, assisted by Mr. Eric Robins, was Master of Ceremonies, Mr. W. Brown of Charlottetown was censor sceler.

After the Gospel, the pastor Rev. O. Kites gave brief history of the parish during the past one hundred years recalling the various parish priests who labored in the parish, the priestly and religious vocations, etc.

Rev. G. J. McLellan, P. A. V. G., Summerside, preached the sermon on this occasion showing reasons why the Catholic people left Scotland and came to P. E. I. also their love of their faith, their spirit of sacrifice, etc. He urged his hearers to hold fast with traditions of their parish and not to be carried away by the false doctrines of today—to put into practice the teachings of Christ as given by Christ to His Holy Church.

The choir under the direction of Mr. P. L. Boudreau sang the Sixth Tone Mass, Rev. B. Gillis, D.D. of Charlottetown being soloist. In the afternoon a delightful picnic was held on the church grounds. CRIME PUNISHMENT (ONWARD)

In a recent book by a Chinese, Lin Yutang, he says that the only reason why official corruption remains in China is that "we have never shot the officials, not one of them." And Russia in her desperate attempt to do in a generation what other nations have taken ten generations to accomplish, has taken to the shooting of those who seem determined to resist the forward movement. Shooting is a desperate remedy which few will advise, but all will agree that if punishment for wrongdoing in high places were prompt and in keeping with the gravity of the offense, wrongdoing would be greatly discouraged.

If a man steals a loaf of bread we do not hesitate to punish him, but if he steals a million dollars from the people, through fraudulent manipulation of some of the necessities of life, we publish the facts and leave him alone. Once in a while a man gets into penitentiary for wholesale robbery of the public, but mostly it is the smaller fry who are caught and punished. The great crime of legally leaping on the public is not usually punished, and it is sometimes not even punishable, as the wrongdoer is careful to keep "within the law." But we must not forget that the greatest robbery is often that which hedges itself around with legal protection. If sins against the people were punishable even when they were "within the law," there would be fewer great fortunes and there might be fewer paupers.
