**GEORGETOWN, Sept. 25**—(Special)—The King's County Exhibition will be officially opened at Georgetown by Lieut. Gov. Rogers tomorrow morning.

The horse races took place today, a large number coming in by train and team to enjoy an afternoon's sport. The rain, which started at noon, somewhat spoiled the enjoyment of watching the races which were hotly contested.

The entries this year are far in excess of previous years and the fruit exhibit is considered by some to equal if not surpass the provincial exhibits. The entries in the domestic Science Department were never so large and the judge remarked on the great advance in the quality of the exhibits especially the bread.

The flower exhibits were also large and the variety of sweet peas, asters, etc., made a choice showing.

The ladies of King's County are certainly clever needle women as is demonstrated by the large exhibit of needle work in the different classes which were nicely shown off.

This year the exhibition buildings have been greatly enlarged and are so nicely arranged as to make a picturesque display. The courteous directors have done all in their power to make the King's County exhibition the success it assuredly is and they deserve great credit for their energetic work. The poultry and live stock exhibits do not come in until tomorrow morning when judging will be immediately commenced.

### RACES.

The races were very keenly contested though run off in occasional showers.

**GEORGETOWN, Sept. 29**—The exhibition opened with a large attendance. Lieut. Gov. Rogers, who arrived last night went over the entire exhibit and in his speech complimented the people of King's County on their energy and ability in getting up such a fine showing. Complimentary speeches were also made by J. A. Matheson, Leader of the Opposition, Laughlin McDonald, East Point, and L. A. Fraser, M. P., Souris. Mr. McDonald presented the medals for the best County to James A. McDonald, Litter Pond, for the best kept farm in King's County East, and to John Anear, Lower Montague for King's County West. During his speech, he spoke in keenest appreciation of the showing of exhibits.

It is estimated that some three thousand people passed through the gates during the two days of exhibition.

The sheep and cattle were of an exceptionally good class, and the judge, was especially pleased with the classes shown and said they were of a better quality than shown for some years, and in many of the classes six to eight pairs will be brought out.
