**RESISTANCE ORDERED IF GERMAN CONTINUE INVASION.**

LONDON, Feb. 21.—The Russian Government, according to another official statement, received here, has addressed the following message to headquarters and all the fronts: "The Council of Peoples' Commissaries has offered to the Germans to sign peace immediately. I order that in all cases where Germans are encountered, massed, that poor parlers with the German soldiers should be organized and the proposal to refrain from fighting made to them. If the Germans refuse then you must offer to them every possible resistance." (Signed) "KRYLENKO."

**BERLIN STRIKERS PUNISHED.**—AMSTERDAM, Feb. 20.—A number of persons who took part in the recent strikes in Berlin have been sentenced to prison by extraordinary courts-martial. The heaviest sentence, forty-two months of penal servitude, was imposed on a metal worker named Ratajok for attempting to hold up a street car. Another metal worker named Meyer was condemned to serve eighteen months for a similar offense. A boy of 17, also a metal worker, was sentenced to a term of two years, and another boy to six months for distributing leaflets and urging women workers to strike.

## American Bravery

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—Stories from front by The Associated Press tell of the intrepid daring of the Americans in trench raiding operations. Their coolness under fire and returning fire, the accuracy of aim of their gunners and their watchfulness at observation posts to see that the enemy obtains no undue advantage in a surprise attack.

The only criticism thus far heard regarding the Americans is their desire to be up and at the enemy. Like their brothers of the North—the Canadians—they are hard to hold in restraint. As one distinguished French officer expressed it, "they are too anxious to get at grips with the enemy."

There still is no indication of the new approach of the expected big offensive by the Germans, along the line in France and Belgium. The operations consist almost entirely of trench bombardments and minor attacks by sifting parties. The roar of the big guns is greater in the Champagne region on several sectors, particularly near Tahure, where one unit of the Americans is fighting shoulder to shoulder with the French.

The Italian Front.

Likewise all along the Italian front from the Lake Garda to the middle of the Piave River artillery engagements are in progress.

Saturday night's attempted air raid on London proved a failure, only one German aeroplane of the six that came across the water, reached the capital through the heavy barrage set up by the British anti-aircraft batteries.

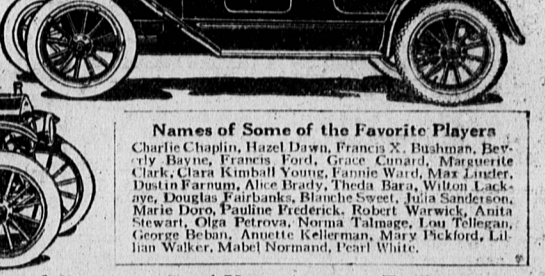
