West India Liner Took Big Cargo Supplies And For Sufferers.

HALIFAX, Jan. 23.—The P. and P. Hoe B.t.s. sailed for Kingston, Jamaica, at 7.45 o'clock last night with supplies for the earthquake sufferers. Nearly \$10,000 worth of necessities, consisting of fish, potatoes, rice, beans, peas, butter, cheese, canned goods and tents, were forwarded by the steamer, the gift of the Canadian Government.

One thousand tents, with poles and necessary fixings were sent. It was first intended to forward 500 tents, but the order was subsequently doubled. The tents are valued at about \$20,000. It is expected that the Beta will reach Jamaica by the end of the month.
Collector of Customs Mitchell, who was instructed by the Government to purchase these supplies and arrange for their shipment, has acted very promptly. Mr. Mitchell received word by telegram on Friday night and yesterday afternoon everything was ready and the papers in connection therewith will be in Ottawa within a week of the time when the instructions to forward the supplies were issued.

VALUABLE INFORMATION REGARDING RUBBER TRADE.
R. C. Goff of Goff & Co. who has been attending a convention held by the Rubber Association in Montreal arrived home yesterday. He says it is expected that for the coming season opening next March that rubbers will be the same price as last year with the exception of a few lines that will probably be 5 cents a pair higher. The United States Rubber Companies have advanced their prices about 5 per cent. In regard to the importation that old rubbers bought up by junk dealers being put into rubbers again is a mistake. The old rubber is too dead and would not stand up if put into a new rubber consequently it is not a common thing as doomsday articles. A pair is paid for men's old rubbers in Montreal for P. E.
