YANKEES SWEEP SERIES WITH CINCINNATI

National Leaguers Lose Fourth Game In Tense, Exciting Diamond Struggle

Home Runs By The New York Powerhouse Is The Deciding Factor In McCarthymen's Brilliant Achievement — Last Tilt Is Decided In Tenth Inning.

(By Sid Feder, Associated Press Sports Writer) CROSLY FIELD, Cincinnati, Oct. 8.—In one of the daffiest finishes in all world series history, Cincinnati Reds' defences blew up today and let New York Yankees win their fourth straight world championship by a 7-4 10-inning victory in the fourth game of the 1939 fall baseball classic.

After fighting back from an early disadvantage into which home runs by Charley Keller and Bill Dickey had dropped them, the National League champions fell apart in the 9th and 10th innings, and the Yankees scored five times in those two frames on four hits and four Reds' errors, to pull out the decision.

And for 32,794 fans, lifted to roaring heights of delight by the Reds' seventh-inning three-run scoring spurge, this finish was a heart-breaker, for it came about on a collapse of the one feature that stood out for the Reds in the first three games—their fighting fielding.

This lapse of the Reds' defences topped off an up-and-down collection of performances by the five hurriers who saw action. Tall Paul Derringer started for the Reds but the loser was Bucky Walters, who took over in the eighth, and thus was charged with his second defeat of the set.

For the Yankees, Johnny Murphy received credit for the first series victory of his career, although he saw action in relief roles in each of the last three sets. He entered the game in the seventh, after Oral Hildebrand had retired because of an ailing side and Steve Sundra had been tagged for the Reds' first three runs.

Thus the Yankees completed their domination of baseball for the fourth time in a row and for their eighth World's Championship. Eleven times they have won the American League pennant.

An "Absolute Gift"

Today's victory, however, was virtually an absolute gift. Everything happened in those last two frames—and it all happened to the Reds. The mess started simply enough, when Keller, the hero of yesterday's game with two home runs, led the ninth with a single. The Yankees were behind 4-2.

Joe Dimaggio followed with a slashing single through short, however, and the fans came to attention again, their fingers crossed. Then things started to happen. Bill Dickey sent what looked like an easy double play ball to second, and Lonnie Frey made a nice pick-up. But Billy Myers dropped the flip to the bag, Keller scored and Dimaggio was safe at second.

After Dimaggio went to third on George Selkirk's liner, Joe Gordon hit to Billy Werber at third, who made the pick-up and pegged to the plate trying to get Dimaggio. The idea was good but didn't work. Dimaggio slid in with the trying run as Ernie Lombardi dropped the ball and Werber's low throw. It was ruled a single for Gordon.

In the 10th inning with one out and Frank Crosetti on second by virtue of a walk and a sacrifice, Myers made his second miscue of the game by bobbing Keller's bouncer back of second.

Dimaggio shot a single into right field. The ball got away from Ival Gooden and Crosetti came in and Keller rounded third and headed for home. Gooden relayed to McCormick, who whirled and threw to the plate, trying to get Keller. Lombardi dropped the relay and let the ball hit the base line. He lay there a few seconds, as the ball rolled about five feet from the plate. Since no one made an effort to go after it, Dimaggio, who by this time had reached third, caught the enemy flatfooted by breaking for home. Too late, Lombardi went after the ball and Dimaggio scored the third run of the inning.

Big Gate Taken

Today's gate was \$150,243.82, of which \$75,624.35 went into the players' pool. The total pool for the Series was \$380,117.84, of which the Yankees took \$159,648.49 and the Reds \$106,434.00.

To the regular rate figures is added \$100,000 for radio rights, of which the players' pool receives \$60,000. This brings the total players' pool to \$440,117.84, of which the

SATURDAY'S GAME

CINCINNATI, Oct. 8.—(AP)—The New York Yankees' powerhouse, after travelling in low gear before masterful pitching for two days, broke loose its home run lightning Saturday to smash Cincinnati Reds, 7-3, for the third straight victory in the 1939 World Series.

With pitching giving way to the attack on both sides for the first time in this Series, the Yankees blasted four home runs—two by Rookie Charley Keller—and gave 32,723 homeclub rooters a display of their vaunted dynamite.

In near mid-summer weather, the Yankees made only five hits to 10 for the National League Kings—but they didn't waste a one, as rookie Junior Thompson served his "boom boom" ball to them in just the right spots in the first five innings.

Keller clouted his first four-bagger after Frankie Crosetti walked in the opening inning. Then clouting Charley drew a pass with two out in the third and Joe Dimaggio snapped out of hitting doldrums with a towering smash over the 38-foot mark in centrefield.

Red Rolfe singled with one away in the fifth, and promptly was brought around by Keller's second four-bagger. Dimaggio only managed an infield fly in this frame, but catcher Bill Dickey, up right behind him, crashed a homer deep into the bleachers.

That was the end of Junior, the 22-year-old righthander, who didn't have anything even closely resembling the stuff shown by his pitching mates, Paul Derringer and Bucky Walters who lost the first two games in New York, despite heroic hurrying.

That, too, was the end of the Yankees' assault, for Lefty Lee Gossion and young Lloyd Moore handcuffed them completely all the way through the last four innings. Not a Yankee reached base in that time, and only three of them managed to hit balls out of the infield.

On the other hand, the Yankee twirling, although well below the form of Red Ruffing and Monte Pearson in the first two games, was not bad, once it got started. Lefty Gomez, holder of the all-time record of six straight World Series triumphs without defeat, started for the American League rulers, although still suffering somewhat from the injured side which put him into a hospital for several days.

But it wasn't Lefty's day. He tossed only one inning, and was promptly tagged for a run, when, with two out, Ival Gooden beat out an infield hit, Buck McCormick sliced a single to right, and Ernie Lombardi slashed a grounder through the infield for a run-producing base hit.

Lefty took his turn at bat in the second, and then was "lifted" in favor of Bump Hadley, the pitcher who pitched the first two games. Bump apparently was summoned without a long enough warm-up in the bull pen, and gave up the Reds' other two runs before he settled down. This rally by the Rhinelanders in the second gave them a momentary lead.

It began with one out, when Billy Myers shot a single through short. Thompson looked a single into short left, sending Myers to second. Werber then drove a line-single to centre and Myers came home as the roar of the crowd

Kid Lulu Succumbs To Injuries

BATHURST, N. B., Oct. 8.—Paul Doucet, 20, junior welterweight boxing champion of Canada, and Adelardo Grisdale were injured fatally early today in an automobile accident ten miles from here. Two others were injured, one seriously. Doucet fought his professional bouts under the name of Kid Lulu and was well known in eastern Canada, particularly the Maritime Provinces. He was born at Bathurst. His nearest relatives now reside at Timmins, Ont. Doucet was killed instantly.

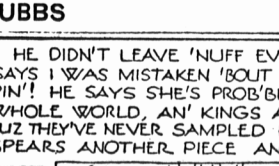
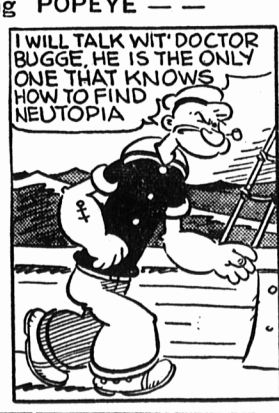
St. Mary's Wins Rugby Crown

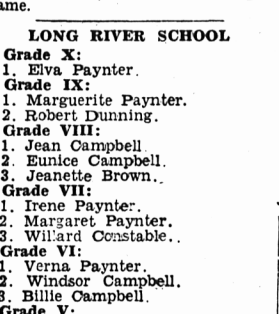
