Big Plane Leaves Here For New York

The four-engine Douglas American Army transport plane which made an emergency landing at the Charlottetown Airport Wednesday night, took off for Mitchell Field, New York, at 10:30 a.m. yesterday.

Among the 25 military personnel, which made up crew and passengers, was Mr. Maynard Owen Williams, war correspondent and chief of the foreign editorial staff of the National Geographic magazine. Mr. Williams was returning to Washington after 16 months in the Near East where he was preparing an article on Saudi Arabia.

Mr. Williams and Capt. Van Doren, in charge of the plane, had warm words of praise for the hospitality shown them by the ladies of the Canadian Legion and those of the local Red Cross. Refreshments were served the crew and passengers of the plane by Mrs. Arthur Henry, Mrs. Lew Howatt, Mrs. Hugh MacKay, and Mrs. A. E. Gosh. Transportation from the airport to various places in the city, where the passengers and crew spent Wednesday night, was arranged by Mrs. E. E. Palmer and Mrs. E. M. Bagnall.

CONCLUDES Red Cross Crippled Children's Clinic

Dr. T. B. Acker, orthopaedic specialist of Halifax left the Province on Monday afternoon after having completed a very busy week during which he examined 210 cases—156 children and 54 adults. During this short time he also performed seven operations and supplied 15 plaster casts.

It is gratifying to note that 32 cases were discharged from the clinics—8 as cured, 15 as improved, 1 unimproved and 8 for whom there was no treatment that could be prescribed at this type of clinic. A great number of children were referred for exercise and massage to the Red Cross Corrective Clinics conducted three times weekly at Red Cross House in Charlottetown under the direction of Miss A. M. Price, Physiotherapist.

Dr. Acker held these clinics in Charlottetown and Summerside where the Public Health Nurses assisted and the Medical Doctors gave their full co-operation to this Red Cross project. Members of the Red Cross Corps helped by driving patients and from the clinics and to the hospitals.

Funds for the carrying on of the Red Cross program are raised by the Junior Red Cross members in the schools of the Province which are augmented by generous contributions from the Charlottetown Rotary Clubs from their yearly auctions.
