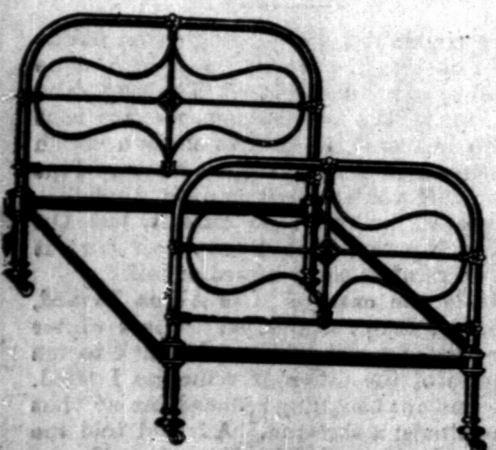

BONUSING INDUSTRIES.

In the west when a large new industry is about to spring up many towns compete for the advantage of having it located in their midst. The promoters of the new industry look about them to find where they can secure at once a favorable site and the largest inducements. One town offers the new concern exemption from taxation for a term of five or ten years. Another town offers exemption for a longer term, with perhaps a free site thrown in. Another offers exemption from taxes and a cash bonus, and so the competition goes on. In other cases one town will offer a liberal inducement to a manufacturing concern to remove thither from its present location.

All this is unfair to existing industries which have paid taxes from the beginning and must continue to do so, without having received municipal aid of any kind. This is usually pointed out in the preliminary discussion, but the advantage of obtaining a new industry which will bring in work-people and their families and cause a considerable weekly disbursement of money, and so build up the town, usually carries the day. The town of St. Johns, Quebec has recently had some unfortunate experiences along this line which it may be well to quote. A firm engaged in the manufacture of vinegar, pickles, &c which had got into financial difficulties in Montreal was induced to remove to St. Johns by being voted a bonus of \$22,500 by the latter town. This was less than two years ago. The firm has since received \$17,500 of this bonus, but has again got into deep water and is unable to continue operations.

About six months ago, as related by the Monetary Times, the same town had a similar experience with a cigar manufacturing firm to whom it voted a bonus of \$10,000, of which \$7,000 was paid down when the concern moved there. In less than a year the firm became insolvent and the estate did not pay ten cents on the dollar to the town or any one else.

The first two weeks in December will be a rather lively time for elections. On the 7th the Belfast and Murray Harbor by-elections in this Province will take place, and on the same day the general elections in Manitoba. Four by-elections in Ontario are announced for 12th December.

Premier Greenway is a farmer, 61 years of age. He was born in England and came to Ontario when young, with his parents. He represented South Huron for a short time in the Commons and removed to Manitoba in 1878. In the following year he was elected to the Manitoba Legislature. He became leader of the Opposition in 1887 and Premier in the following year. He has been frequently returned to the Legislature by acclamation. In religion he is a Methodist.

The enthusiastic admirers of Admiral Dewey who presented him with a costly residence have been somewhat troubled in mind by a report that he has conveyed the title to his wife. The Chicago Tribune mentions that some of them have caused their views on the subject to be made known to the Admiral. It appears that Mrs. Dewey before her marriage had a considerable private fortune and the donors think that she might well wait for the conveyance of the house by will in case she should survive the Admiral.

Hon. Hugh John Macdonald, son of Sir John A. Macdonald, and leader of the Manitoba Opposition, was born in Kingston in 1850. He is a lawyer by profession and has been twice married. He served as a private in the Fenian Raid of 1866, as Ensign in the Red River Expedition of 1870 and as Lieutenant and Captain in the 90th Battalion in the Northwest Expedition of 1885. He was returned to Parliament as member for Winnipeg in 1891 and was for a few months member of Sir Charles Tupper's Administration in 1896, in which he held the portfolio of Minister of the Interior. Mr. Macdonald has not yet been a member of the Manitoba Legislature.

It is not pleasant to read that the Boers have cut the railway communication south of Eastcourt, where we have an army division of some ten or twelve thousand men. No doubt they are well able to take care of themselves, but they are isolated for the time if the report is true. There seems likely to be great difficulty in bringing the enemy to a general engagement in the field, but they seem to cover the entire country with small bodies of a few hundreds to a few thousands. General Buller is likely to find the Boers the most troublesome enemy he has yet met.

Up to the beginning of November the exports of butter from Montreal reached 444,376 packages, being nearly double the member of the previous year and almost fourteen times that of 1894. This gratifying result is almost wholly due to the cold storage plan. Canadian cheese has become

famous in the British market. Canadian bacon has obtained a firm foothold, and our butter is rapidly coming to the front. There are splendid chances also to develop a great trade for Canada in poultry, eggs, canned meats and vegetables, fresh fruit, pickles, &c. The export of fowl to the British market this fall and winter will be larger than ever before, and is capable of indefinite expansion.
