The large potato warehouse of Mr. John C. Pillman of New Annan was completely destroyed by fire of unknown origin on Monday night. Two refrigerator cars belonging to the C. N. R. which were on a siding near the building were also burned.

The fire was noticed about 11.30 p.m. and had gained such headway that in 20 minutes it was a total loss. It was stocked with potatoes and grain. There was also a gasoline engine in the barn which was destroyed. The estimated loss of building and contents is in the vicinity of \$15,000, with a small insurance. The building was built about three years ago and much sympathy is expressed for Mr. Pillman at the loss especially at this season of the year.—S

The S. S. Gypsum Queen of Middleborough, England, arrived in port Monday evening. This steamer was built by the Furness shipbuilders Co. Ltd. Haverton Hill-on-Tees, Captain C. W. Copsell is the master of the ship. She arrived here from Baltimore Maryland, with a cargo of 5,000 tons of fertilizer, and is expected to leave here at the beginning of next week and will proceed to Windsor, Nova Scotia, with the balance of her cargo, 4,000 tons will be discharged in Charlottetown.

Her regular trade during the summer months is from U. S. A. and Windsor, Nova Scotia, with a general cargo and Gypsum from Windsor, N. S. to the United States. She also carries passengers on this trade and her staterooms are equivalent to any of the transatlantic steamers. During her passage here she encountered three days fog, from the American coast to Halifax. Her total length is 350 feet and her breadth 52 1-2, she has an average speed of eleven knots. She is fitted with modern up-to-date equipment for quick despatch and speed. She is also fitted with gyro compass owing to her trade in the

northern latitudes. She is one of a fleet of four steamers of this line, namely, Gypsum Queen, Gypsum Prince, Gypsum Empress and Gypsum King.

During her passage here she encountered three days fog, from the American coast to Halifax. Her total length is 350 feet and her breadth 52 1-2, she has an average speed of eleven knots. She is fitted with modern up-to-date equipment for quick despatch and speed. She is also fitted with gyro compass owing to her trade in the

northern latitudes. She is one of a fleet of four steamers of this line, namely, Gypsum Queen, Gypsum Prince, Gypsum Empress and Gypsum King.
