81 YEARS OLD CONFESSED MURDER

(Canadian Press.) PHILA. Jan. 20.—Tottering under the weight of eighty years, Wm. Eberwein, stood in the Criminal Court here today and told a simple dramatic story of how his wife fifteen years younger than he, pleaded with him to kill her and how he committed the deed. After the old man completed his story Judge Walling fixed the charge of murder in the second degree and sentenced the prisoner to solitary imprisonment in the Penitentiary for not less than seven years and not more than fourteen.

TEMPERANCE IN TRURO.—Those in the street say there has been something doing in liquor prosecutions this week says a Truro exchange. That several papers were served, and one case tried. It is reported on the best of authority that two or three detectives arrived in Truro last Saturday. Some say they are the two men who recently overtook on the Island, but we think this is a mistake. Members of the town council say they know nothing of these men, and that if they are catering here it is not under their direction or consent, that what prosecutors are being carried on are by the town's regular officials. A man approached a well known citizen and temperance man last Sunday night at the close of the service in one of the churches and said he was a devotee of the cause. The gentleman approached said in effect, that he was not interested in that branch of temperance work, and the matter ended there.

RECALLS GREAT NAMES.—In his recent book "Our task in Canada," Rev. R. G. McBeth recalls a bit of the history of presbyterians in the maritime provinces and pays a worthy tribute to the early leaders, in the following paragraph: "The honor of the first regularly constituted Presbytery in what is now Canada goes to Truro, where in 1786 a meeting was held, the next in order being Pictou in 1795. This goes far back for a new country like ours, and the names of the early ministers suggest all the romance, devotion and sacrifice of pioneer missions. James McGregor, of Pictou, travelling on missionary tours, enduring much hardship, and even persecution. Thomas McCulloch, noted educationalist; Donald McDonald, the great evangelist of Prince Edward Island, and many others like men whose work adds to this day. The strong character, fearless integrity and conspicuous success of the Maritime Province people who occupy places of influence and leadership all over the continent, must be due in large measure to the splendid foundation work done in these ancient colonies by the early missionaries."

TO BE REINSTATED.—A committee appointed by President Gasford, President of the Maritime Provinces Branch of Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, and consisting of Mr. Ira J. Y. B. A. U. C. chairman, L. B. McMillan and Dr. Reid, have looked into the case of Messrs. Charles Burns and Anthony McSkill, who are charged with endeavoring to promote professional hockey on the Island and have come to the following conclusion:—in view of the fact that this was the first attempt made along the line of promoting professional hockey, and that athletes, assisting in this way, were unaware of the fact that they were imperiling their amateur standing, and considering that the chief promoters were men outside the amateur ranks, the committee decided to recommend reinstatement for Messrs. Burns and McSkill, but they wish to issue a warning that in future any amateur engaged in promoting professional sport will be at once suspended without any hope of reinstatement. 8.45
