ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY OF PRINCE COUNTY

The Children's Aid Society held its annual meeting in the Civic Building, Summerside, on Tuesday evening, November 8th. The attendance was fair and the President gave a brief resume of the activities of the Society during year, giving a creditable report of a quiet work done in receiving neglected children and establishing a measure of kindly control over the lawless youth of the town.

Nine meetings were held during the year with an average attendance of seven, and the President deplored the lack of interest shown by the members and the public in this work which is really vital to the welfare of the community.

Among the wards under supervision at the present time, one has been placed in a good home for adoption. One is in the Protestant Orphanage and several are in the Roman Catholic Orphanage. Two are in a Reform School in Halifax.

The President regretted the loss to the Society in the resignation of the kindly and efficient agent, Mr. Geo. D. McNutt but considered that John C. Todd who had been ap-

pointed in his place would ably fill the position as he had frequently assisted Mr. McNutt. He also commended the good done by the Juvenile Court. Mr. McNutt, the retiring agent, then gave a report in detail of his fine work and hearty vote of thanks was given to him and to Miss C. E. Holman for giving Sec'y Treasurer for their ut-
