World says: On the special private car Camberland which arrived from the East this afternoon, Lady Davies, wife of Sir Louis Davies, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, and her party arrived. In the party were the Misses Davies; Miss Maribel Davies, a niece, and Rev. Cecil Wiggins, rector of Sackville, N. B., and brother of Lady Davies. The members of the party were met at the train by several personal friends, Capt. Wallbran of the D. G. S. Quadra, Harbor Master Capt. McLeod, and Resident Engineer J. R. Roy were among those who greeted the new arrivals at the train. The party were conducted to the Quadra and left later this afternoon for Victoria, where they will remain on a visit for several days. They will then come back to visit friends in Vancouver and New Westminster.

EASTERN NOTES.—Farmers are about done their cropping, and frequent showers dispel the fears they once entertained of a dry season. Crops all look well with the exception of hay which missed the May rains.—There is some codfish at present but hardly any bait, rendering the outlook discouraging for our fishermen. Lobsters still are plentiful with the exception of Red Point, where they are rather scarce.—The cheese factory is again open with prospects of a largely increased output.—William Whelan, of Batic, and Geo. Mellick, of Lakeville, arrived home a few days ago from our Republican neighbors. Mellick was victimized of some dollars in Boston depot by a smooth-tongued stranger by a plan often adopted, and often successful. 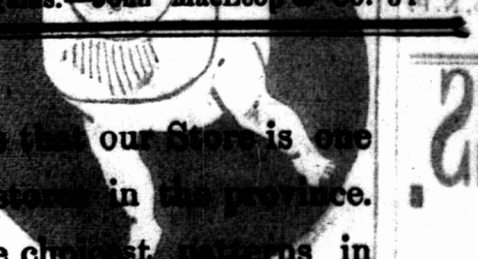
