THERE were many people in the City yesterday from the outlying country districts. Travelling is reported to be rather heavy yet, but there will be good sleighing if there is no more snow for a few days.

By a telegram received here yesterday from Quebec the sad news was learned of the death of Mrs. Regale, wife of M. Regale, contractor for the ornamental work in the interior finishing of St. Dunstan's Cathedral. Mrs. Regale came to Charlottetown last spring with her husband and family and they spent the summer here. She left recently for Quebec with her children, leaving her husband here. M. Regale left yesterday, hoping to reach his wife's bedside before her death.

At the Police court yesterday five citizens from various parts of the city were each fined \$2 and costs for not having the sidewalks cleared of snow beside their premises. After the performance of the ceremony the party repaired to the dining room where all partook of a rich repast which had been provided for them by Mrs. McLeod in her usual dainty way. The remainder of the evening passed pleasantly away and Mr. and Mrs. MacDonald start out in life together with the good wishes of a large number of friends. The Guardian extends to Mr. and Mrs. MacDonald its hearty congratulations on the happy event and wishes them a happy and prosperous married life.

THERE passed away at her home at Park Corner, on Saturday morning, Dec 1st, after a severe illness Miss Annie McKay, in the 28th year of her age. The death of Miss McKay is deserving of more than a passing notice. She was the only daughter of the late Daniel McKay (elder). THE steamer Renwick, which has been discharging coal at this port for A. Pickard, will endeavor to leave today, with the assistance of the steamer Minto.

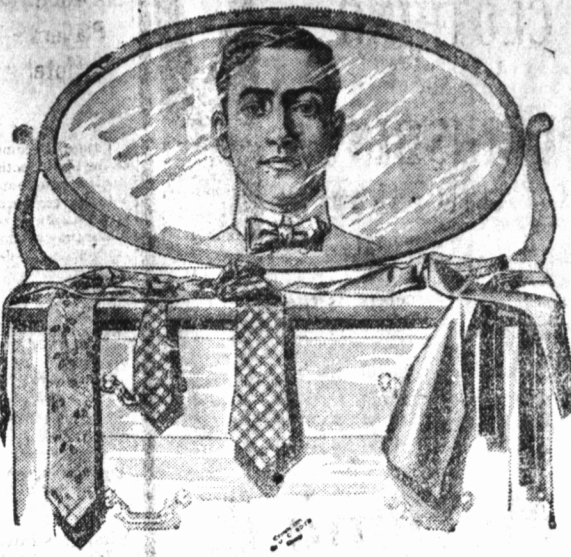
CITY subscribers who lock their storm doors at night are requested to arrange some place for carrier to leave paper, so that it will not blow away or be stolen.

It must be regretfully added that this freight is accumulating because there is not sufficient means afforded by the one steamer Minto, making one trip every other day from this port to transport it.

A DISGRACEFUL exhibition was made yesterday by three men who were evidently drunk and ill-treating a poor horse which was unfortunate enough to be in their charge. The horse was brutally kicked and beaten on the head with a bottle, and this happened on Queen street in the most public part of the city. By this new addition the clerical work of the hotel which is extensive, will be conducted with much comfort, and the convenience of patrons will be enhanced by the change. It is a pleasure to record the fact that many other changes have recently been made in addition to this one, the total result being that the Victoria is now in a position to challenge comparison with any hotel of its class in Canada. This is a gratifying fact, when the conditions of a few years ago are recalled to mind and the good hotel was one of the greatest needs of Charlottetown.
