COUNTRY MAKES GREAT STRIDES

Visit to Largest Nickel Deposit in the World—Story of a Great Industry—How the Ore is Removed From the Ground.

COPPER CLIFF, Feb. 27.—To realize what has been accomplished since the discovery of the nickel deposits at Sudbury it is necessary to recall that in 1880 Copper Cliff was still a wilderness. At the present time perhaps five thousand people directly or indirectly draw their living from the ores discovered in this wilderness. From Sudbury as a centre a circle of twenty miles might be described to the north and west that would contain almost all the nickel to be found on the North American continent.

WILL MAKE THE JAPS INCREASE THE STATURE

Jap Surgeon General Thinks He Can Make His Nation the Home of Men of Normal Size—So Will be Removed the Chief Humiliation of the Race.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 27.—That he will increase the size of the Japanese race to the normal stature of the Caucasian race by teaching them how and what to eat, was the declaration made by Surgeon General Takakal, of Japan, in a lecture, delivered in the medical lecture room of the University of Pennsylvania yesterday afternoon. The Surgeon-General quoted statistics about the men of the army and navy, to prove that by giving them a proper diet he has brought them nearer the standard of weight of the men of the English and American navies.

EMPEROR WILL HELP. Gen. Takakal declared that many diseases common in Japan have been almost wiped out by the same method. He made it his life work to find a method by which the size of the Japanese race can be made normal.

"Within a few generations, I am sure that the Japanese race will be of normal size," he added. "It is one of the greatest humiliations of our life that we are so small. The Caucasian race is normal in size and that is what we want to be. That is what we will be within a short time if the people of my race follow my directions. The Emperor has promised to join hands and help the work along. Learned men must now agree that the Japanese only need proper food and all of it they can eat."

NEARLY MILLION JAPS STARVING LIKE BERNHARDT

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 23.—The Post-Intelligencer today started an original effort to secure a shipment of wheat for Japanese famine sufferers. The paper subscribes 18 tons of wheat and calls for subscriptions in kind to be shipped, if possible, March 12. Latest Oriental mail advices show that nearly a million persons are starving, and food is needed more than money.

HIGH FIGURE FOR A MARE MR CARNEGIE DIDN'T HELP

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—The green mare Carolina Dawson, whose sale for \$10,000 was the real feature of the recent New York auction cost the man who sold her, Oliver H. Bain, of Philadelphia, \$3,000 two years ago. She is seven years old, and by Car 3 (2121), son of Russia (2292), by Nutwood (213) her dam being foams, by Walkin' Prince. The demand for her was due to the fact that she trotted a very easy second to Mainsheet in 2:54 at Lexington last month. E. E. McCargo, who so surprisingly rejuvenated Wentworth (241), made this showing with her.

ISLAND SEIZED BY ARMED SCOTS

EDINBURGH, Scotland Feb. 27.—The crofters of Barra Island, Hebrides, have seized the neighboring island of Vatersay, and declare their intention to resist by force of arms any attempt to dislodge them.

A regular war expedition was fitted out by the invading islanders, who collected a fleet of boats, and, with flags, flying and pipes skimming Highland battle tunes, soon effected a bloodless landing on Vatersay, hitherto used as a game preserve.

The Barra men for years have claimed the right to cultivate Vatersay, but have been unable to get the necessary permission from the authorities, and, now that they have seized the island, have apportioned it into small farms and distributed them among themselves.

QUESTION FOR THE TRANSVAAL

LONDON, Feb. 27.—Trading on the stock exchange opened more cheerful today, all departments sharing in the improvement. Kaffirs had an appreciably better tone on the statement of Winston Spencer Churchill, under secretary of state for the colonies, in the house of commons outlining the government's policy on the Chinese labor question in South Africa. Briefly summed up the Liberal policy is that there shall be no violent expulsion of the Chinese but that while some of the most servile conditions of indenture will be eliminated, the ultimate decision of the question to be left to a responsible government of the Transvaal.

That appears in another column by David Reid, Victoria Cross, Prince Edward Island. This very promising young horse has taken three first prizes at the Provincial Exhibition Charlottetown and his dam at three years old took first prize in her class and diploma over all ages as best Clydesdale mare any age at Halifax in 1901.

TRIAL NOT A SUCCESS.

OAKLAND, Calif., Feb. 27.—An unsuccessful trial was made by Professor Montgomery's aeroplane at Idora Park yesterday, and it almost resulted in injury to David Wilkie, the aeronaut.

LORD ALMOST DROWNED.

CALGARY, Alta., Feb. 27.—Lord Seymour and two horse buyers, while attempting to cross a River at Cochrane narrowly escaped drowning. The team and rig went through the ice, and Lord Seymour was thrown into the water, where he struggled for several minutes before being rescued.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Homestead Regulations.

ANY over-numbered section of Dominion lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 5 and 25, not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 10 acres, more or less.

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Winnipeg, or the local agent receive authority for some one to make entry for him.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following classes:

(1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father or mother, if the father is deceased, of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land, entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of the homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
