MEN ON PAROLE ARE DOING WELL

DORCHESTER, Nov. 11—Dominion Parole Officer Archibald, of the Department of Justice Ottawa, arrived in Dorchester today. Mr. Archibald is inspecting the parole system and expects to visit St. John, Halifax, Sydney and Charlottetown before returning to Ottawa. Mr. Archibald stated to a Reporter today that the men now on parole are doing exceptionally well.

LABOR LEADER TO FORM AUSTRALIAN CABINET.

MELBOURNE, Nov. 11—Mr. Fisher, one of the radical labor leaders of Australia, will form the new Australian cabinet. The House defeated Premier Alfred Deakin on the division. The Laborites withdrew their support because the government has not pushed labor measures radical enough to suit them. This will be the second time the Labor party has been in power in the Australian Federal Parliament. J. C. Watson, another of the labor leaders, was Premier for a short time in 1904.

APPALLING TRAGEDY IN GERMAN COAL MINE

Explosion of Fire Damp Imprisoned Four Hundred Miners Amid Roaring Flames. Few Can Escape. Heroic Efforts at Rescue Prove Fruitless. Three Hundred Probably Dead.

HAMM, Westphalia, Germany, Nov. 12—(Special)—There was an explosion of fire damp in Radbod mine today which will result in a heavy loss of life. Already twenty-seven bodies have been brought to the surface and 300 men are still under ground in grave peril. Four hundred miners were working in the pit at the time of the disaster. About 70 have been brought to the surface. Of these the majority are injured and one has died.

One hundred and fifty men are in shaft number two, and it is believed all are doomed. Rescuers have arrived from all directions and the work of getting below at once is being attempted. Efforts were necessarily slow and were attempted with extreme difficulty. One of the shafts together with its elevator cage has been completely burned. An improvised cage was sent down with a corps of rescuers who made

heroic efforts to reach their comrades. The fire had made such headway that the rescuers had to be called back to give way to fire-fighters and the flames are still spreading. The vicinity of the mine is surrounded by police and the public are not permitted to approach. Despairing scenes are being witnessed among the crowds of relatives gathered outside the police cordon. The loss of life it is estimated will be not less than three hundred.

ITALIAN LORD VISITS CANADA

To Select Location For Colony of His Countrymen in the West.

MONTREAL, Nov. 12—(Special)—The Marquis De Longhede Pastori, cousin of the King of Italy, is on a visit to the Dominion for the purpose of selecting a location for an Italian colony in the west. The Marquis, who leaves for Vancouver tonight, has been lavishly entertained by the Italian colony during his stay. On the way across the continent he will visit several suggested locations for the proposed colony.

TERRORIZE BY POLITICAL CRIMES

CALCUTTA, November 11—The city of Calcutta is terrorized by an outbreak of political crimes. The daring but unsuccessful attempt made three days ago on the life of Sir Andrew H. L. Fraser, the lieutenant-governor of Bengal, was followed by a murder yesterday evening. A Bengali detective, who had been active in trailing the revolutionists, was shot down on a crowded street by three men who practically filled his body with revolver bullets. The people fear to give information concerning the criminals lest vengeance be visited upon them. The police are powerless.

TURKEY BUYING CARTRIDGES.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 11—The Turkish government has given an order in Germany for three hundred million cartridges for the Mauser rifle. Delivery must be made in two years.

DOG WALKS WITH A GRAFTED LEG

NEW YORK, November 11. — Among the latest achievements of science described by Dr. Alexis Carrel, at the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research, was the transplanting of one dog's leg onto another dog's body. The feebler patient readily assumed normal control of the new leg, which was taken from a dead dog, and within three weeks the wound showed only a scar and the dog was up and around on all fours. — Three that were originally his and one of the late lamented other dog's. The transplanting of cat's kidneys into other cats, even after the organs have been in cold storage sixty days, has proved entirely successful. Human arteries and jugular veins have been interchanged, and the patients haven't been able to tell the difference. Application of the experiments performed on dogs and cats to the rejuvenation of ailing humanity is, in the announced opinion of Dr. Carrel, entirely possible.

LEFT SIX HUNDRED FOUR-LEAF CLOVERS

NEW YORK, Nov. 11—The will of Jere M. Lyon, a merchant of Bedford, in the northern part of Westchester County, was filed with Surrogate Frank V. Millard, at White Plains recently. Mr. Lyon left property worth one hundred thousand dollars and kept all his bank books in a metal bag, which was found after his death. In the bag was a wallet stuffed with four leaf clovers. The merchant was a great believer in the theory that there was good luck in four leaf clovers and he had been accumulating them for a lifetime. The wallet contained more than six hundred of them. Mr. Lyon leaves thirty thousand dollars to his wife, Mrs. Susan B. Lyon, and fifteen per cent of the netted upon them. The police are powerless.

SIR RICHARD OBJECTS TO PAYING THE TAX.

OTTAWA, November 11. — An important question will come before the local court of revision this month and may eventually have to be decided by the courts. The assessment department, having assessed the salaries of all the cabinet ministers, from the premier down, Sir Richard Cartwright has given formal notice of appeal in order to test the validity of this new departure.

FORTY DEATHS FROM DIPHTHERIA

In Caraquet, N. B. and More Dying. Health Authorities Are Sending Anti Toxin.

ST. JOHN, Nov. 12—(Special)—Premier Hazen received a despatch from Caraquet telling of a serious outbreak of diphtheria at that place. There have been upwards of forty fatal cases and more deaths are likely unless vigorous measures are taken to combat the spread of the disease. The message asked that a supply of anti-toxine be sent. Dr. Fisher, Secretary of the Provincial Board of Health heard of the outbreak and forwarded a full supply of anti-toxine.

THE DEATH WAS SUDDEN

OTTAWA, Nov. 4—The death occurred on Monday afternoon at her late residence, 43 Park avenue, of Caroline Florence Anderson, wife of F. Anderson, civil engineer, and daughter of the late Sheriff Sweetland. The primary cause of death was stated by the attending physician to be an abscess in the inferior maxillary bone, and the immediate cause, precipitated by chloroform. Mrs. Anderson had been under treatment for nine days. The deceased was born in Ottawa and had always lived here. Her marriage occurred four years ago and she leaves two children besides the husband. The funeral will be private.—Ottawa Citizen.

HALF OF EUROPE IS NOW QU

inhabitants of a Large Area in a State of Shocks are Intermittent.

LONDON, Nov. 11—Central and Southern Europe have been quaking intermittently for several days, the centre of the disturbances being the Voightland district of Saxony. No body has been injured, but the inhabitants of a large area are alarmed, and sometimes in a state of panic. Numbers of people have occasionally spent the night outdoors. The worst shocks of the series occurred on Monday. People were thrown from their beds, furniture was overturned, and some walls were rent. Pilsen, Dresden, Freiburg, Erfurt and other towns were roughly shaken, and people left their houses in terror. Numerous towns in Gotha and Anhalt were also shaken. The earthquakes were also accompanied by terrifying roarings and explosions which on Monday were thunderous in volume, lasting from five to ten minutes. The air vibrated alarmingly,

HUNTERS SHOT IN NOVA SCOTIA

Two Badly Wounded. One Will Die. Not Known Who Fired Deadly Shot.

Halifax, Nov. 12—(Special)—A serious shooting accident occurred at South Uniache this morning. Neil McDonald and Douglass McDougall, while out shooting in the woods, were both so badly wounded by the discharge of a gun that the life of the former is despaired of and the latter is in almost as serious a condition. Who fired the shot could not be ascertained, but it is supposed to have been another hunter who was unaware of the result.

CARS DERAILED NEAR ROCHESTER

By Broken Rail Cause Wild Confusion But No One Was Seriously Hurt.

ROCHESTER, Nov. 12(Special)—Three cars in the Twentieth Century Limited were thrown from the rails today, but strangely enough not one of the passengers was badly injured. A broken rail caused the accident. There was the wildest confusion for a time after the accident. All the passengers were violently thrown from their berths and it was thought at first there must have been loss of life, but investigation showed no one even seriously injured.

CANADA WILL LOSE ISLAND

OTTAWA, Nov. 11—The dispute over the boundary about Passamaquoddy Bay, an arm of the ocean between Maine and New Brunswick, which has continued for 124 years, will be settled by papers found in Marietta, Ohio, recently in the Marietta College library. The boundary dispute had remained open since 1784, and the State Department at Washington, in seeking a settlement, called upon the college officials there for an examination of the records known to be among the archives in the library. All the notes and maps made at the time of the survey of the boundary by Rufus Putnam were found. It is stated that the maps in the collection cover all disputed points, and show that Pope's Folly Island belongs to the United States. Copies will be at once forwarded to the State Department. It is believed that these papers and maps will settle the international boundary dispute which has heretofore caused an expense of hundreds of thousands of dollars in the attempt to reach an agreement. Pope's Folly Island is a very small parcel of land. It is not marked on any map nor mentioned in any gazetteer. Minard's Liniment Cures Distemper.
