THE Master of the Rolls leaves this morning by train for Georgetown to attend the meeting of the Supreme Court there. The court was to have met on Tuesday but has been adjourned from day to day since by the Sheriff. If the petty jurors have been unable to reach Georgetown the court will likely be further adjourned by Mr. Justice Hodgson.

IN the supreme court of Maine recently Judge Whitehouse granted a divorce to Dwight F. Harley, aged eighty-seven years, of Old Orchard, who asked for a separation from his wife, Mrs. Hannah Harley, on the grounds of cruel and abusive treatment, and that she kept too many cats in the house. After many conferences between the judge and counsel for Mr. and Mrs. Harley, a division of the property was agreed upon.

Eleven government boats and one opposition boat left Cape Traverse yesterday morning reaching Tormentine at 2:10. Among the passengers who crossed were Cyrus J. McMillan, returning to Cambridge, Mass., W. W. Stanley en route to England, Mr. Haslam and Wm. Vickerson of Victoria going to Calgary, N. W. T., Wm. Collett and John and Bertram McIntyre leaving for British Columbia and Allan Parsons to Montreal.

REV. G. F. Dawson, M. A. preached most acceptably at York, Sunday morning. Notwithstanding the unusual state of the roads the church was comfortably filled. The choir was well represented, Mrs. Dawson presiding at the organ. The text chosen was, Acts 19, 2, "Have ye received the Holy Ghost since ye believed." The churches may be well organized, the salaries and equipment all that could be desired, but without the power of the Holy Ghost no good would result. This lack of spirituality is greatly deplored today, leading to non-fulfillment of duty, consequent dissension, and many other indications so inimical to the cause of Christ.

THE sixth annual meeting of the Canadian Forestry Association will be held in the city of Quebec, on March 9 and 10, 1905. The arrangements of the program is well advanced. Among the papers promised are "Forest Fires in British Columbia", Prof. R. W. Brock, Queen's University; "Northern Quebec and Labrador", Mr. A. P. Low, of the Geological Survey; "Forest Insects", the Rev. F. T. Fyles, Lewis; "Forest resources of Quebec", Mr. J. C. Langelier, Department of Lands, Mines and Fisheries; "The Lumber industry", Mr. P. G. Owens, secretary of the Quebec Lumbermen's Association; "The forest of New Brunswick", Mr. T. G. Loggie, Fredericton; "The fire warden system in Nova Scotia", the Hon. J. W. Longley. It is probable that a trip on the ice breaker 'Montcalm' will be among the arrangements. On Friday evening a dinner will be tendered the visiting members by the friends of the Forestry Association, in the city of Quebec. The prospect is that this will be the most successful meeting that the association has yet held.

A LATE issue of the Bermuda Colonist has the following of a presentation to Captain Leukten of the S. S. Dahome: This morning, at 10:30 o'clock, while Captain Leukten was walking on his bridge, a deputation from the passengers of the Dahome, headed by J. H. Bell, Summerside, P. E. I., requested his presence in the cabin. On entering the Dahome's saloon, Captain Leukten met with a most cordial reception by his passengers, all of whom were there assembled. Mr. Bell, who acted as spokesman, requested his fellow-passengers to join him in presenting Captain Leukten with an address and a testimonial by way of expressing their appreciation of the manner in which he had conducted them through great danger and a most trying experience safely to port. After making some complimentary remarks upon the sea-going qualities of the Dahome and the skill of her commander, Mr. Bell read the address, and then, on behalf of his fellow-passengers, presented Captain Leukten with the address and a sterling silver cigar case, suitably engraved and filled with Havana cigars.

THERE is much truth in the following from the Pictou Advocate: "The St. John Sun in reporting the arrival in that city of a belated train from Boston, tells of one of the passengers, a gentleman from Charlottetown, whose first enquiry was about the steamers Stanley and Minto, "but," says the Sun, "the I. C. R. officials had no late information. They simply knew that the boats had been tied up at Pictou and Georgetown for ten days." This complaint is a common one. In Pictou it is heard every day from travellers who come here solely on chance of being able to cross to P. E. Island, and many of these people when unable to cross, are seriously inconvenienced by this oversight on the part of the railway authorities. As we pointed out last season, someone here, the I. C. R. station master or the captains of the winter steamers, should be instructed to wire every morning to all I. C. R. stations within twenty-four hours travel from Pictou, the probable position of the boats for the next twenty-four hours. Lack of information concerning train and boat connections is the greatest fault travellers, especially strangers in the country, have to find with the I. C. R., and in this particular the People's Road is sadly behind other lines. "I guess so," "I think so" and "I'll try and find out" are the answers most frequently made to those who seek information from I. C. R. station men and in so far as the movements of the P. E. Island steamers are concerned it gives rise to justifiable denunciation of the officials in authority on the I. C. R.

GOD in His mercy has seen fit to remove from the home of Benj. Aitken, Lower Montague, one of the most loved members in the person of Arthur Head, a little boy of seven years and seven months. The deceased was the son of E. L. Head, Hazelbrook. While yet an infant he was left without a mother's care. The vacant place was filled by Mrs. Benj. Aitken in whose affectionate care he grew up to be the light and joy of the home. On Monday Feb. 20th he was taken ill and in spite of medical aid and all that loving friends could do, he passed away on the following Saturday. On Sunday his remains were laid to rest in Lower Montague Cemetery. He was an exceptionally bright boy and endeared himself to all who knew him, but it is in the home where he had come to be loved as a true child of the family that his bright face and pleasant voice will be most missed. And though death has stilled his little lips for ever, those who have loved and tended him have the beautiful assurance of a Saviour who received little children, that his soul has entered heaven and is now numbered among the ransomed ones, who stand forever around the great white throne of God. To his sorrowing father and to the father, mother, son and daughter who so lovingly received him into the bosom of their family many friends extend heartfelt sympathy.
