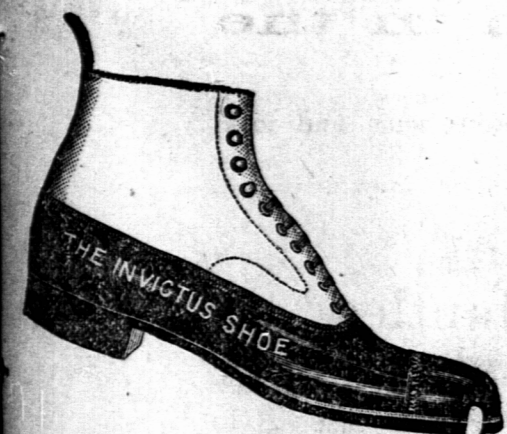

Presented With Lacrosse Outfit in Gold-Mounted Case at Cornwall.

AT MONTREAL VIEW THE FAMOUS GOLD RIVET

In Victoria Bridge—Gifts Exchanged—St. John Thronged With Visitors to See the Royal Party—Streets Ablaze With Decorations—British Veterans Arrive from Boston.

DUKE RECEIVES A LACROSSE SET.
