Ottawa Visit Of N. B. Premier Stirs Rumours

OTTAWA, Aug. 25 (Special)—Presence in Ottawa today of New Brunswick Premier John B. McNair and the fact that he was closeted with Prime Minister King in the east block this afternoon for upwards of two hours tends to color the report that Mr. King is seeking a Minister of Fisheries to succeed the late Hon. Frank Bridges in the province of New Brunswick.

Premier McNair arrived in the capital unobtrusively, and eluding newspapermen made his way to the Prime Minister's suite of offices in the east block. It is understood that his conference with Mr. King dealt not only with the general political situation in New Brunswick but with the choice of a successor to Mr. Bridges in the former Conservative riding of York-Sunbury which the late minister represented.

York-Sunbury Bye-Election Set For Oct. 20

OTTAWA, Aug. 25 (CP)—Following a cabinet meeting today, Prime Minister Mackenzie King announced the date of the Federal bye-election in York-Sunbury, N.B., as been set for Oct. 20. The seat was left vacant by the death two weeks ago of Hon. H. F. G. Bruges, Federal Fisheries Minister.

Vancouver Banker Shot By Bandit

VANCOUVER, Aug. 25 (CP)—A lone gunman shot and fatally wounded S.S. Petrie, manager of a branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, which was being robbed here today. The gunman, who was seen in the act of shooting, was released later and police reported that no arrests have yet been made.

TORONTO, Aug. 25 (CP)—New prices for Chevrolet and Oldsmobile automobiles, ranging from \$81 to \$288 higher went into effect Aug. 19. General Motors dealers disclosed here today. Increased cost of production is the reason given.

They were reported pasted up by three boys and three girls about 19. The stickers bore the printed lines: "S.S. Producers 1947—British floating Deceit."
