er part of this tax, and then spend it in their own housekeeping. "This Corporation should have this money to help in the upkeep of its streets."

Very good, Mr. Higgs! The Liberals should never have handled the money that belonged to the city. You are rather late in bringing this before the citizens. Keep it before the citizens that the Liberals stole their rights.

Mr. Speaker, I have told you something of the Liberals' record when in office, an average deficit of \$40,000 yearly for 2 1/2 years. How much, I ask, Mr. Speaker, will Mr. Higgs or any other Liberal receive for street improvements from a Government who during their long term of office had nothing but deficits? The citizens of Charlottetown are not going to be hoodwinked. I would advise the Liberal city candidate to study the past history of his party and see if he can find one single benefit that the provincial Liberals ever did for the city. As has already been said, the Liberal Government has done nothing towards improvements, as far as the city is concerned.

Within the past two years the Conservative Government have in this city opened one of the best Domestic Science schools this side of Montreal. This school is free to every girl in this city and province, be she poor or rich, Protestant or Catholic, or any other denomination. I am glad to say that the young girls are taking advantage of the school and by what they learn in cooking will save many a dollar for the future husband. This is part of the practical work the present Government is doing for the people.

Here is another part of the address delivered by the Liberal candidate. The City of Charlottetown has long suffered in the treatment meted out to it by the Provincial Government.

For many years a grant was given for the Provincial Exhibition which was held on the spacious grounds of the Charlottetown Driving Park and Provincial Exhibition Association. Last year this was withheld and we would have had to go without an Exhibition if it had not been for the patriotism of the Exhibition Association and the citizens of Charlottetown who put their hands in their pockets and put up the necessary funds or no Exhibition would have been held in 1918.

I simply give this as one example of how this city has been treated. I notice that one of the candidates for the City of Charlottetown had a good deal to say about the government refusing a grant for exhibitions. He attributed the credit for last year's exhibition to the generosity of the merchants of Charlottetown, who contributed a sum sufficient to make the exhibition possible, yet in looking over the list of generous contributions I fail to find that Mr. Higgs himself contributed a dollar. This is the kind of assistance the citizens of Charlottetown may expect from their Liberal friends.

Mr. Higgs condemns the present Government for not giving a grant last year for an Exhibition, Liberal candidates and Liberal members all seem to be troubled with short memories. Here again I have to remind them that during the time they held office the grant for Exhibition was not only withdrawn once but, if my memory serves me right, I think the grant was refused no less than 3 or 4 years; one of the date I do remember—1898. I think it was about that date the teachers' supplements were taken from them. The honorable Leader of the Opposition thought our teachers were too well fed in those days.

Another thing that happened about the same date: A reduction on interest from 4 per cent. to 3 per cent. on the farmers' loans was under consideration and the year ended with a grand deficit of \$42,331.75. All this happened in time of peace. In what condition would our province be if the Liberals were in office, or had been in office during the past four war years?

Mr. Higgs also referred to the Hillsboro Bridge, and approaches. He said: "It is simply preposterous to think that these approaches should be allowed to fall into such a state." Mr. Speaker, the approaches are certainly not in as good a condition as I would like to see them. The approach on the city side of the bridge would be in a splendid condition if the Liberals had kept their promise and carried out the agreement that was made between the Liberal Government and the city.

I have here a copy of the proposal between the local government and the city of Charlottetown, dated June, 1906. Here it is: "That the Government shall provide all the material and labor necessary for the building of a roadway from the railway crossing on Grafton street to the end of Hillsborough Bridge as shown on the plan now produced. In consideration of their doing so, the city agrees

to crush all the stone necessary for the work, to haul the same and place in position as required by the Government Engineer and roll with the steam roller." Dated 14th day of June, 1906. (Sgd) Arthur Peters, Premier. (Sgd) James Paton, Mayor. Mr. Speaker, just allow me to say a word or two with reference to Falconwood Hospital. From time to time the honorable members of the Opposition side of the House attacked the management and trustees of this institution. Their onslaught has been so fierce that I began to think that probably if it were managed by a Liberal Government it might be done more economically. I have looked back at their record and what do I find? First of all, a contract was given in 1896 to build a new wing to the hospital, the amount put on the estimates was not to exceed \$2,500. The building was erected and cost \$41,805.84. So that the work which the Legislature authorized to be constructed not to exceed \$25,000 actually cost \$41,805.84, a difference of \$16,805.84, and even with all that extra expense the building was unsafe for patients.

Some of the honorable Opposition members have declared that if they were in office they could run the institution on about half what it is costing the present Government. Let us go back and look over their record. For five years previous to the Liberals coming into office the upkeep of the hospital averaged a little over \$17,000 a year. That was during the Conservative government. In 1901, under Liberal rule, it jumped to \$22,358.54, now watch how careful and smart those honorable members were when in office, during their last ten years.

Or, by the Conservatives being in office they have saved to the province no less than \$37,479.47 by their good management of the hospital.

When the Conservatives took charge of the Falconwood farm, the buildings were in a dreadful condition. Today look at the difference; everything in first-class condition. The past records of the institution show that when the Liberals had charge of the hospital the trustees rarely visited the place, although they were supposed to be paid for so doing. It is different now. The place is regularly visited by the trustees and interest taken in the welfare of the institution that was never taken before.

There is a capable staff, thoroughly qualified for their duties and the institution is working smoothly and satisfactorily in every way. The honorable member for Second Queens complains that no Seed Fairs are now held in Charlottetown, and blames the Government for this also. I want to tell the honorable member that here again he is talking about something that he knows nothing of.

I have here in my hand a copy of a notice sent to the members of the Seed Fair Committee last February. The meeting was held; the Commissioner of Agriculture was present and he offered the committee every assistance within the power of the government. The whole matter was thrashed out for two hours and finally the committee decided not to hold a Central Seed Fair in Charlottetown. Here is a copy of the notice: Dear Sir—A meeting of the Central Seed Fair Committee will be held in the office of the Commissioner of Agriculture, Charlottetown, on Wednesday, February 26th, at 11 o'clock.

Ships Now Property Of United States

(Special to The Guardian.)

WASHINGTON, May 7.—All the Kaisers and Kaiserins, der Grosses, the American the Vaterland and other big ocean liners which belonged to Germany and were seized in American ports during the war are now the actual property of the United States at a cost of about \$100,000,000 of the money the vanquished government owes the United States.

The announcement was made here today that a cable message had been received from American sources at Paris that the Supreme Peace Council
