### Recent Convention Of Sheep Breeders

The annual meeting of the P. E. I. Sheep Breeders' Association was held in the Agricultural Hall on Friday, Nov. 14, 1919. A goodly number of sheep raisers from various parts of the Province were in attendance and matters of importance to the sheep men of the province were thoroughly discussed. After the adoption of the minutes of the last meeting the report of the year ending June 31, 1919 was presented by the Secretary. This report in brief is as follows:

Number of sheep insured during year.	Insurance received
Grades, Sheep 687	
Lambs 370	\$35.40
Pure breeds, sheep 111	
Lambs 74	8.52
Total 1242	\$36.46
The insurance paid out for losses in sheep killed by dogs amounted to \$297.00.	

The report on the Annual Co-operative was also tabled by the Secretary. A full account of this sale is given elsewhere. Strong and favorable commendation of the movement was expressed by those present, and a determination was expressed to bring the benefits of co-operation in the selling of this product to the attention of all sheep raisers in the province.

At a previous meeting of the Association it was agreed that the rate of insurance for sheep would be five cents for grades and ten cents for pure breeds. Some discussion took place on this subject, and it was definitely decided that the new rate go into effect immediately. The price of sheep has advanced to a great extent during the last few years. suffering losses in their flock from dogs and other wild animals should receive a higher rate of remuneration than allowed under the old schedule, and it was to meet this increase that the new rate of insurance was passed. Sheep raisers should remember this increase when insuring their sheep in future. It was also decided to charge an Association membership fee of fifty cents annually, such fee to be taken out of the wool returns. Farmers shipping five fleeces or under of wool will be exempt. This fee is to be a fund to cover certain expenses of the association, marketing wool etc.

The fiscal year of the Association was also changed from June 31st to December 31st. The Annual Meeting would then be held in January at the time the Farmers' Institutes and Egg Circles meet in convention, which would be more convenient for farmers who could attend the meetings of

the various organizations. At the close of the meeting a number of shares were taken in the stock of the Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers, Limited, through the Provincial Director, Mr. W. H. McGregor, Central Lot 16. The next meeting will be held in January.

### LADY RHONDDA ADMIRES CANADIAN HOUSEKEEPING

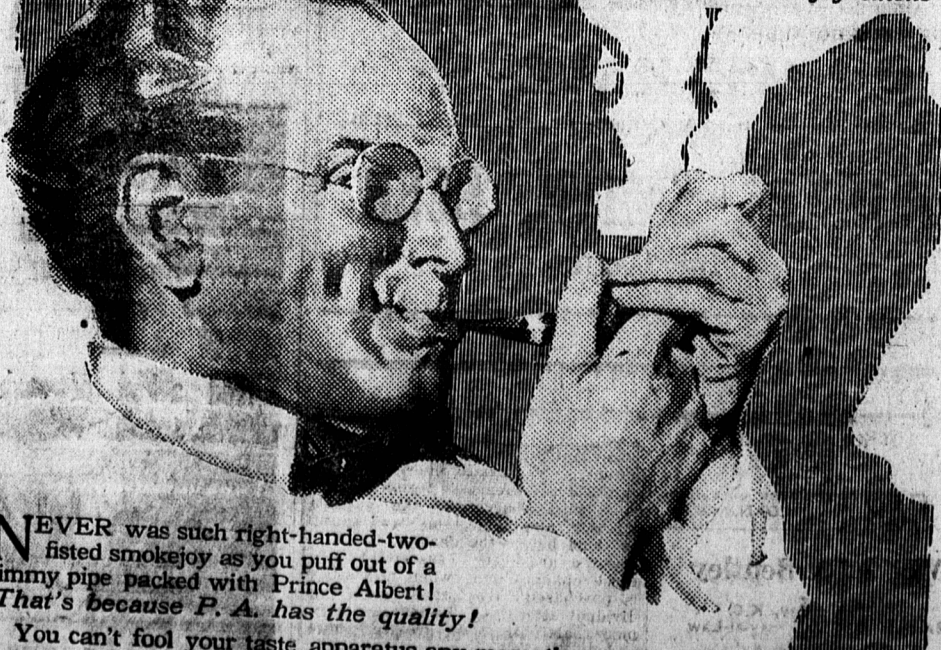

### CONFIRM SHORTAGE OF CARS IN CANADA

OTTAWA, Nov. 18.—The report appearing in the press giving the statement of the United States Railway Administration relating to the abnormal conditions brought about by the car shortage in Canada, was shown last night to officials of the Department of Railways and Canals. In reply, they declared that the statement made in the House of Commons by the Minister of Railways and Canals, in answer to the inquiries made by members regarding the serious situation in Canada, was absolutely correct. Twenty thousand Canadian box-cars, over and above the number being held by American companies, and it was further stated that unless immediate relief is given a serious situation may arise within Canada.
