Convincing Wins For Martin And Nunns In Singles

Doug Grant, Halifax Ace Wins Way Into Third Round Ontario Tennis Championships.

TORONTO, July 16—Before a powerful invading force from Montreal had even reached the scene of action, Toronto's chief hopes for the Ontario men's singles tennis championship, Walter Martin and Gilbert Nunns, rattled off convincing notice today that the home defenses are sturdy enough. While the three seeded Eastern entrants, Marcel Rainville, Bobby Murray and Laird Watt were scheduled to take up the role of challengers tomorrow, the Toronto aces hurried into the third round without losing a set between them. Martin, defending champion and Canada's No. 1 singles player, won two matches.

The big lawyer, bringing his game along at a fast clip for next week's Canadian championships, ousted J. A. Dickinson, Toronto, 6-0, 6-1 in the first round and topped J. J. McDougall, Toronto, in the next round, Martin and Doug Grant, Halifax, Canadian badminton champion, were the only two to reach the third round.

Grant, improving as he went along, upset young Hugh Pope, London, Ont., in brilliant fashion, 6-3, 6-1, after battling three sets with Brian Doherty, Toronto. Grant lost the first set to Doherty, then went on to triumph at 3-6, 6-2, 6-2. In the evening he teamed with Shields, Toronto, and won a first round men's doubles match 6-4, 6-3.

Nunns, confronted by such names as Murray, Don Leahong of Jamaica and Ross Wilson of Toronto in the lower half of the draw, opened his campaign with a 6-1, 6-0 win over B. Young, Toronto. Leclerc easily eliminated K. Davis, Newmarket, Ontario, 6-1, 6-1 and Wilson, Toronto city title holder, ousted E. Everett, Toronto, 6-2, 6-1. Most of the tennis fans who attended the first day's matches timed their visits to see the touring Jamaicans, Leahong and Daves. They saw Daves in a hard-fought struggle against Jack Pope, London, Ont., youngster who made it close throughout.

Rainbow 6 CANADIAN And Yankee Win Races MARKSMEN IN FINAL

NEWPORT, R. I., July 16.—Rainbow, skippered by Harold S. Vandenberg, today defeated Westamoe, skippered by Dick Boardman, by three minutes and 39 seconds over a 30-mile course in the brisket breeze yet to favor the trials to select a defender of the America's Cup.

A good portion of Rainbow's lead was accounted for by the fact that Westamoe went over the starting line three seconds before the signal, and was recalled and forced to re-cross it. In this manner she lost approximately three minutes.

While Rainbow was beating Westamoe, Yankee, the Boston aspirant, sailing in a second division, was defeating Vanitie by six minutes. Yankee's time for the 30-mile windward-leeward course was the best of the day, being two minutes and four seconds under that required by Rainbow.

Killed by Blow From Propeller

CHATEAUGUAY BASIN, Que., July 15.—Knocked unconscious as she was swimming in the Chateauguay Basin today when struck by a runaway motorboat travelling in reverse gear, Kathleen Scullion, 17, of Montreal, sank just far enough for the boat's propeller to cut her head open, causing her death. Jeanne Davidson, 12, of this place, was also struck by the propeller and is in critical condition in hospital with a severe gash in the back.

The victim and her companion, as well as several other persons, were swimming in the Basin while the launch, accidentally set in motion by one of its occupants broke its moorings and sped away backwards in the direction of the swimmers. Miss Scullion saw the craft backing to open causing her death. Jeanne Davidson, 12, of this place, was also struck by the propeller and is in critical condition in hospital with a severe gash in the back.
