"Merry Christmas and may all your wrinkles come from happy smiles."

The message that rang over Bethlehem still echoes so that it's ours to help bring goodwill to men. One has asked, "How shall we stand in the estimate of the future, when our sons shall tell their sons the story of it all?"

Cannot you make this solemn Christmas worthy of the coming of the Christ-child by helping to prevent it being desecrated by drunken orgies, lives lost by accidents and crime? Let us all try to make this holy day a day of peace at home in a town or city where the liquor traffic is not permitted to enter upon its sanctity and sanity. We each have a door of our own to keep clean. Have you a broom?

PLAN OF WORK

1. We believe that all progress towards Christian living and much of its effectiveness in Christian service is dependent upon our vital touch with the Master. Therefore, we earnestly recommend that the Evangelistic Department of our Union and that we use the excellent programs sent us by our Superintendent, Mrs. Macnab.

We further urge all to remember Noonday Hour of Prayer, and to observe the World Day of Prayer in January.

2. Since the introduction of the Government Liquor Stores, drinking among young people has become more and more fashionable and many mothers use our abundant small fruits for making home-made wines to supply the demand thus created.

Recommended that in Mothers' meetings, through the Press and wherever possible, we show the harm of this practice and give recipes for making temperance beverages.

3. We recommend that every Union pay special attention to the department of Sabbath observance and in cases of violation of the Lord Day's Act to advise the Secretary, Rev. E. J. Warr, Sackville, N. B., who will strive to make a most tactful adjustment of the case.

4. The Canadian White Ribbon Tiding, as an official organ, is one of the strongest bonds to hold together in our interests in separate localities and to fit us for good citizenship. Therefore we recommend that we do our very best to keep its pages well filled and to increase our subscription list for 1940.

5. We recommend that as part of our campaign for Peace we observe the second Thursday in December or as near to that date as possible, as a Peace Day, and also observe Goodwill Day, May 18th.

6. Recommended that this year



We stress particularly the harm of moderate drinking in the Press, in schools and in the home, by distributing quantities of literature on the subject, and by pledge-signing.

7. We recommend that Unions place copies of "The Cigarette as a Physician Sees It, Plain Facts for Girls, Science Speaks to Boys," and the W. R. "Tidings" in libraries, schools, offices and wherever possible.

8. We recommend that the Government be asked, through the Supt. of Education, to place a Director of Temperance Education in the schools, if not for full time, at least for six weeks or two months. Secure the co-operation of all social organizations possible in making this request.

9. In order that White Ribbons may become better informed on the Alcohol and Narcotic questions, we recommend that Unions arrange for Study Groups, even if only a few can meet. Invite your neighbors and knit for the soldiers while one reads. (Serve no refreshments.)

TEMPERANCE AND CHRISTIAN CITIZENSHIP

An Important Resolution

The Dominion Board of the Woman's Missionary Society of the United Church of Canada, in perfect accord with the action of the General Council, passed the following resolution:

"That, whereas there is appearing in Canada an alarming trend toward incorporating the habit of drinking into the observance of Christmas, New Year's and other celebrations, the Dominion Board of the Woman's Missionary Society of the United Church of Canada appeal to its members to maintain the standard of exercising their hospitality at all times as to exclude alcoholic beverages from their homes."

That the Dominion Board of the Woman's Missionary Society of the United Church of Canada requests its members to exercise great care to nurture the youth of Canada in the ideals of true Christian hospitality, and to this end that Christian homes be open at all times to young people and that beverage alcohol be not served.

That copies of the first resolution be sent by the Dominion Board to all national Women's organizations with an appeal for their support.

Physics Scholarships For Dalhousie

On December 14, Mr. J. McG Stewart, Chairman of the Board of Governors of Dalhousie University, received a cheque of One Thousand Dollars from an anonymous donor for the purpose of commencing a Physics Scholarship Fund. The donor has sent, with his cheque, the following statement:

"A donor who desires to remain anonymous encloses One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to start a Physics Scholarship Fund to which he hopes others will also contribute.

The donor wishes the fund to be used as follows:

(1) Both principal and interest shall be used to provide scholarships for advanced students in Physics;

(2) The awards shall be made on the recommendation of the Head of the Department of Physics;

(3) The number and size of the scholarship may vary from year to year at the discretion of the Department of Physics, but the total awarded in any one year shall not exceed Four Hundred Dollars until the fund reaches Three Thousand Dollars.

The donor hopes that these scholarships will encourage some students to take the Honour Course in Physics who would find it impossible to otherwise, but it is not intended that they should be limited to Honor Students."

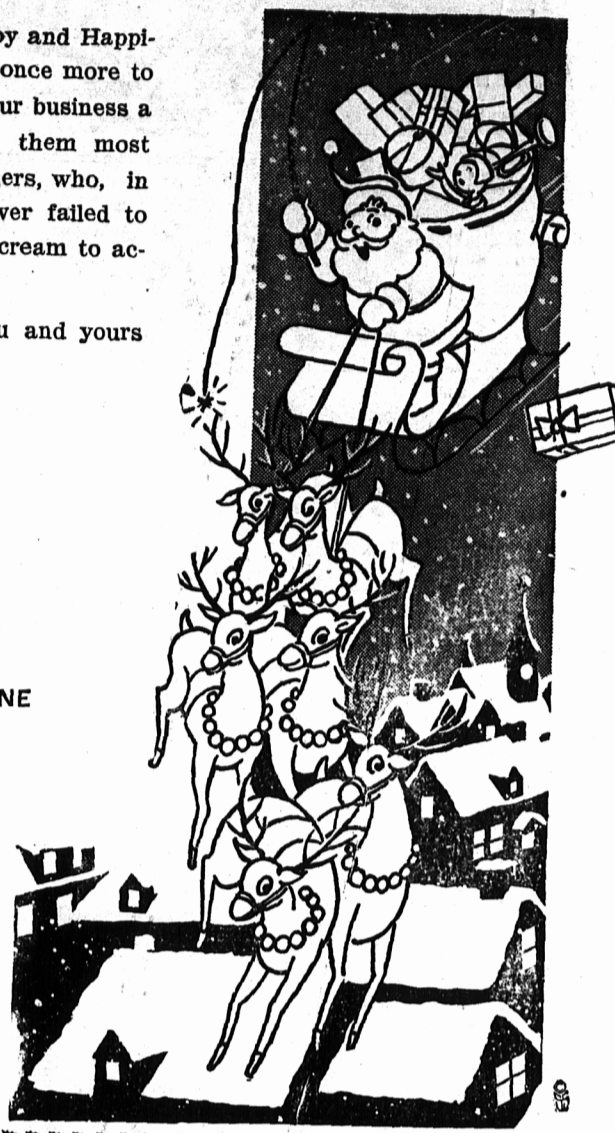

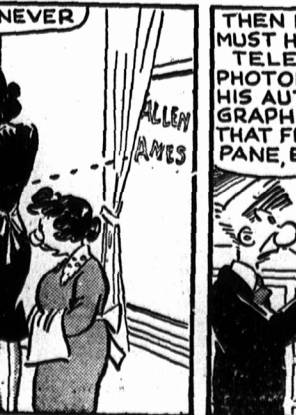
