Woman Diplomat Has Writer Kin

 WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—In the intimacy of her own family, "Madame Minister" Ruth Bryan Owen, United States envoy to Denmark, is one of three Ruths, all writers. They've been having a brief reunion—and William Jennings Bryan's daughter Ruth, and her daughter Ruth, and her daughter Ruth, all had neat and alluring manuscripts to read to each other.
 Grand-daughter Ruth is only 11 years old, but the Children's Page of a Florida paper has been publishing her stories and poems since she was six; and her hand-printed output has a decidedly professional air.
 Madame Minister made her travel book debut last year with "Leaves of a Greenland Diary," a vivid, impressionistic work of her day by day as she voyaged about that little known territory.
 Its popularity brought a call for another such story—and another sea voyage on her annual leave to this country gave "Denmark Caravan" its start. For boys and girls of 12 to 15, or thereabouts, it is designed to capture the romance of old Danish castles, and Danish legends even older.
 A hundred small sketches by Hedvig Collin, Danish artist, will help these tales introduce young America to the quaint Danish church which hops a cock's step every Christmas to get away from a cliff crumbling into the sea; the infant Danish king of medieval times who was carried by a pet monkey to the roof of his castle; Holger Danske, who could bend an iron bar with his handshake; and that amazing castle where 20 maiden women of the nobility live as guests of a queen who died 300 years ago.
 Mrs. Owen's daughter, Ruth, "Kitty" Owen Lehman, wife of Robert Lehman of New York, had her first slender book of short stories, "As the Wind Blows," published last summer. Into her first tale she poignantly put the England she had known as a school girl in prose that was almost poetry in its smoothness. With it she combined a clever twist of plot. Altogether, it caused the critics to recall her grandfather had been called "silver-tongued."
 Mrs. Lehman's daughter, Ruth of the thick golden hair, writes sturdy, swash-buckling stories of wild fights in the dark of lonely castles; heroines who ride rashly into the desert to be caught by Mexican bandits; and the doings of super-intelligent animals she has known. But she can also point a moral to womankind, and one of her own favorites probably would find favor with many husbands.

 His father died on a Friday. Two Fridays later, his daughter died. And just one Friday after that, hospital, badly injured when he was crushed between two coal boxes in the Inverness mine.

 On Friday, Oct. 12th, Mr. Charles A. Stevenson, an aged and highly esteemed resident of New Glasgow entered into rest. He had been ailing for a number of years and his passing was not altogether unexpected.

Mr. Stevenson was a son of the late George Stevenson and his wife Mary Proctor, early residents of the district, who predeceased him by quite a number of years. He is survived by two brothers, James C. and George H., both of New Glasgow, and two sisters, Janie, Mrs. Chas. French of New York and Martha, Mrs. J. L. Stevenson of New Glasgow.

The late Mr. Stevenson was a prominent figure in the community for many years. Although a farmer, he was also a cheese and butter maker and was manager of the factory in New Glasgow for twenty-five years. In public life he won the respect and goodwill of all who knew him. His home radiated hospitality and none in need or trouble applied there without finding a ready response.
 In Nov., 1873, he married Katherine Wares of Wheatley River, and two years ago, after sixty years of wedded life, they celebrated the diamond anniversary of their wedding day.
 He is survived by his widow, one son James H., manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, St. John, N.B., and three daughters, Gertrude, Mrs. (Rev.) H. Bell, East Point; Margaret, Mrs. Allan A. Campbell, Long River, and Annie, Mrs. (Rev.) J. M. Murchison, St. John, N.B. Two sons, Edwin and Frank passed away a number of years since. Besides these members of the family, he leaves eighteen grandchildren and three great grandchildren.
 The funeral was held from the home on Tuesday, Oct. 15th, when a large number of people assembled to pay tribute to a departed friend. The service was conducted by Rev. W. A. Paterson of the United Church, assisted by Rev. W. G. Quigley of the Christian Church and Rev. W. J. MacLeod.
 The pall bearers were: Messrs. Horace Ling, Cyrus Smith, D. G. Nisbett, E. B. MacKay, B. Dickerson and R. H. Binns. Interment was in the family plot in New Glasgow Cemetery.

Coogan Aged 21 Comes Into Own
 HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 29.—(A.P.)—Jackie Coogan, who made his first million before he was 10, legally comes into his fortune this month. He is 21 years old Oct. 26.
 But there will be no immediate change in the present financial reticence, when it is asked whether Jackie's fortune literally will be turned over to him. Arthur L. Bernstein, Coogan attorney for 15 years, will continue to handle the estate.
 Jackie, whom Charlie Chaplin started on the road to fame 17 years ago in "The Kid," is a senior now at the University of California at Los Angeles. One of his courses is photoplay appreciation.
 "Jackie has no positive future planned," says his mother, "although I believe he could be moderately successful in any business. I wanted him to take law, but he said, 'Aw, mother, you know I don't want to be a lawyer.' He'd like to return to the screen, and I'd like to have him, and he has ambitions to direct pictures some day."
 "He is young for his years and I feel that he has sufficient time to make up his mind about his life work. Although he was associated with grown-ups while making his pictures, in between times he lived a perfectly normal child's life. Both his father (Mr. Coogan was killed in an auto accident several months ago) and I made special efforts to keep Jackie from growing up too early in life, and I believe we were successful."

RETIRE SEAMAN SPINS YARNS OF PAST ADVENTURES

 KEMPTVILLE, N. S., Oct. 28 — Captain Samuel J. Hatfield, a real old salt if there ever was one, is one of the few remaining skippers of the high-y adventures days of windjammer, clipper and barque. "Still as straight as a parallel rule" despite his 85 years, Captain Hatfield's memory, chock-full of hair-raising tales of his experiences remains fresh.
 At a moment's notice he can recall the time he met the Czar of Russia in the port of St. Petersburg, now Leningrad, or his adventure with head-hunters he entertained aboard ship near Borneo. The old skipper liked the Czar; the head-hunters, he thought, were "gentlemen in a comparative sense."
 Another time he allowed a group of "Salvationists" aboard for the spiritual welfare of his crew. They took a good collection after services on the ship but it afterwards turned out they were impostors and were arrested.
 Captain Hatfield was trained as a seaman in Yarmouth, N. S., but spent most of his life on British ships out of Liverpool. He retired after visiting practically every port on the globe during his sailing days.
